City Fathers Say Tule Sewer Proposal Not Ready

TULELAKE, May 8—City fathers in session Monday night found that the city's proposition for installation of storm sewers, curbs and gutters cannot be presented to voters on May 27, announced that bids will be called for on drilling a new city water well, confirmed appointment of a new night police officer and referred for a vote of citizens approval, the proposal to build an apartment court in a residence zone.

Because of inability of city engineers and the city attorney to complete all details on the city improvement program before the election date and the necessity for a new ordinance, no city ballot will be presented with the county ballot at the time of the election on the proposed charter form of government. It is probable that the date for the city ballot will be delayed until June and the delay will incur little or no more expense than had the election been completed as originally planned.

With the city water system unable to cope with increasing demands of a larger population and dryness of the season, bids will be called for at once for drilling a new well near the site of the present well.

While the original well is more than 2000 feet deep it is expected that the new hole will go down approximately 700 feet. Present storage capacity is 100,000 gallons and 200 gallons per minute is pumped. More methane gas may be found in a shallower well but under aeration this will be largely eliminated. Hardness of the water is about the same, it is said, at both depths.

Appointment of Ralph Dunlap, for the last five years a resident of Tulelake, as night police officer for the city, was confirmed. He has had law enforcement experience in Oregon.

Charles K. Wiese appeared before the council to ask permission to build an apartment court in a residence zone and the request will be referred to vote of the residents of the zone in question in the west end of the new addition.

Misunderstanding on the use of Main street for parking of trucks was cleared up when the council stated that a one-hour parking limit between the hours of 6 a. m. and 6 p. m. is in effect.
