Slayer Testifies In Will Hearing

VALE, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Al Williams, 24-year-old cowboy, testified yesterday in the court contest over the will left by the man he convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment, was brought to court to testify that the wife of W. D. Broadhurst, wealthy, Caldwell, Idaho rancher, had discussed with him ways of "disposing" of her husband. The will left an estate estimated at \$200,000 to Mrs. Broadhurst, 40-year-old redhead who also was convicted of first degree murder and is serving a life sentence. Broadhurst's relatives are contesting the will.
