Eligible voters are taxpayers in the district and those voting on the district No. 1 budget, Klamath Falls city schools, will go to Fremont school district No. 2, Klamath Union high school, to KUHS, and those voting on the county school budget will go to their respective schools with the exception of lumber camp schools and results of the Altamont-Summers area will go to the polls at Altamont elementary.
