Schacht Gets Prison Term

STUTTGART, May 13 (AP)—Hjalmar Schacht, German financial wizard who was cleared of war crimes charges by the international military tribunal at Nuernberg seven months ago, was convicted as a major Nazi offender by a German denazification court today and sentenced to eight years imprisonment.

Acheson Urges Understanding

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson declared today that world-wide understanding of the United States—its objectives, its principles, and its hopes—would end "foolish talk" that follows policies of reaction and imperialism.
