## Air Unit To Hold Breakfast

Breakfast in the Klamath airport hangar for the Klamath Air Search and Rescue unit and private aircraft owners is planned for May 25, Sunday.

An important meeting of the Klamath Air Search and Rescue unit, host for the occasion, will be held tonight, Tuesday, at 8 p. m., at the hangar, to appoint a committee to handle details of the breakfast.

The Klamath unit has 60 members, all of whom are urged to attend and all aircraft owners, the Klamath sheriff's posse and the Klamath Saddle club are cordially invited to attend or send representatives to the meeting tonight, which will be conducted by Ray Hoysse, president.

The Klamath group was organized in February, 1947, and since that time has assisted on one search for a missing plane and stands in readiness to assist at a moment's notice when a plane is reported missing in this area. Searchers are equipped with maps which can be marked to show the approximate spot where a plane is believed to be, and ground rescue units are sent immediately with supplies and first aid equipment.

Redmond, Bend and Prineville units are extended a special invitation to attend the breakfast May 25. Twenty-three planes from Klamath basin attended the breakfast at Redmond in April.

## Dairy Truck Turns Over

James Reeves, 37, driver for Lost River dairy, suffered injuries early Tuesday morning which put him in Hillside hospital after his truck overturned on the Hildebrand road two miles from that community. Reeves was brought to Klamath Falls by the Klamath Ambulance Service which received the call shortly after 7 a. m. Reeves said the steering gear broke and the truck, loaded with full milk cans, overturned in a farmer's field bordering the road. Reeves was not seriously injured but suffered a badly wrenched knee and cuts and bruises. The truck was badly damaged.

## Two Charged With Robbery

Hubert Lewis Vawter, 21-year-old California escaped convict, was placed in the county jail this morning on a charge of armed robbery, and Arthur Blanchard, 21, also named in the felony complaint with Vawter, is still held in the city jail temporarily.

They are scheduled to be arraigned in justice court this afternoon. Both are accused of holding up a Mexican, Jesus Jara, Sunday night, taking a watch, cigarette lighter and case and some small change, and are said by police to have admitted the robbery.

According to sheriff's information office, Vawter escaped from a California prison camp February 20, 1946. When arrested here he was driving a car stolen from Delano, Calif., a month ago, and also had a stolen Oregon license plate which had been altered.

He has recently been married in Mendocino, giving his name as C. Allen Hudson, one of a half dozen aliases he has admitted under questioning here.

Both Blanchard and Vawter have also admitted an armed robbery in Bend on May 8.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9 (AP)—The securities and exchange commission Thursday approved a sale by California Oregon Power company of 60,000 shares of \$100 par cumulative preferred and 18,000 shares of \$20 par common.

Approval also included the sale of COPCO's parent Standard Gas and Electric, of 390,000 shares of the company's \$20 par common. The shares will be sold at competitive bidding and the commission grants the request of both companies to shorten to six days the usual ten-day period for inviting bids.

Standard will use proceeds from the sale of its holdings in COPCO to pay interest and principal on promissory notes.

COPCO will use proceeds from sale of its preferred and common to redeem at \$110 a share its outstanding 45,761 shares for six percent preferred, series 1927, and to reimburse its treasury for property improvement costs.

The shares to be sold are to be newly issued.
