Connie's Mackmen Giving City Of Brotherly Love Best Ball Philadelphia Fans Have Seen In Years; Torgeson Clouts

Hats off to Mr. Connie Mack, the grand old man of baseball. The 84-year-old gentleman, now in his 47th year as manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, is quietly answering his critics by giving the Athletic fans the best brand of baseball they have seen in more than a dozen years.

His much maligned Mackmen have won six of their last eight games including a 7-6 conquest of the mighty Bob Feller and the Cleveland Indians last night. The A's had to come from behind twice last night to win, scoring the deciding runs in the seventh when Sam Chapman followed a homer off Feller with his own four-master with a man on base.

The Detroit Tigers retained their one-game lead over the Boston Red Sox by shutting out the Washington Senators 4-0 before 17,983 Capital city fans in a night game. Hal Newhouser, who had not won a game since he pitched a shutout opening day, ended his four-game losing streak by blanking the Nats with four singles. The Red Sox continued their upsurge by winning their seventh game in their last eight starts, trouncing the St. Louis Browns.

City's Best Marble Shots Earn Jaunt To Portland

Bruce Brink, 14, and Bobbie Thornton, 12, will carry Klamath's marble tournament in Portland this week-end. They won the local championship in a playoff at Roosevelt school yesterday afternoon. Bruce Brink, a junior high student at Fremont, beat out Rod Dunton, also of Fremont, in the class B (ages 13-15) division, in closely played games of 7-6, 4-9, 7-6. The rules of play stipulate that "winners" will be played in all championship games, using 13 marbles in the center of a 10-foot circle. The two contestants shoot until all the marbles are knocked out, and the player knocking out the most wins that game. So, by the above scores, Bruce got seven of the 13 marbles in both the games he won from Rod Dunton, and Rod knocked

out nine in the game he won. Bobbie Thornton, sixth-grader at Fairview, won the class A (ages 6-12) local title and trip to Portland by beating Donald Hatcher of Mills in two straight games, 10-3 and 9-4. The two boys will be sponsored by the 20-30 club on their trip to Portland May 17, and will vie with the best marblers from other sections of the state for various prizes—a bicycle for the champ.

The marble tourney, part of the Portland Travel and Sports show, will be held at the Pacific International Exposition building.

Livingston Named To Medical Post

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—Dr. William K. Livingston, former Portland and navy surgeon, has been named by the state board of education to head the surgery department of the University of Oregon Medical school.

Dr. Livingston, now guest professor at the New York University Medical school, will assume his duties here August 1.

A graduate of the University of Oregon, receiving his masters degree in 1917, he graduated later from the Harvard University Medical school and studied surgery at Boston and Cleveland hospitals before entering practice here.

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
