Dormitories Given Okay

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—Plans for construction of women's dormitories at both the University of Oregon and Oregon State college were pushed yesterday by the state board of higher education.

The board authorized advertising for bids on the university project, along with bond financing, and accepted bids for the state college project.

Construction of the university dormitory will be in two phases. One calls for a unit of 234 capacity costing about \$1,275,000 and the other for a complete dorm of 480 capacity costing \$2,000,000. The state college project, a million and a half dollar plan accommodating 312 girls, was approved at this time despite bids 21 per cent higher than those rejected a year ago as too high.

Low bids submitted were: general contract—Lease and Leigland Construction Co., Seattle, \$1,142,000; mechanical contract, P. S. Lord, Portland, \$162,873; electrical contract, Ace Electric, Portland, \$49,784.

Award of the contracts was deferred a few days.

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
