Portland Trip—Mr. and Mrs. Don Everett, 524 High, have returned from a week-end spent in Portland.

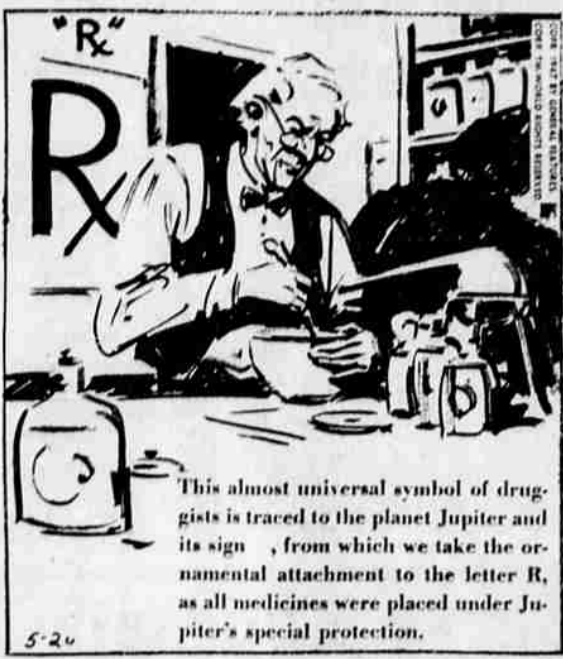
Shopper—Mrs. Sarah Stocum of Fort Klamath was a shopping visitor in this city Wednesday.

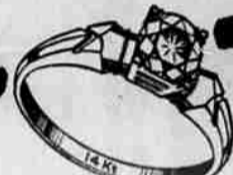
