

Senior Play "Our Town" Winds Up Run Here Tonight

Tonight, Thursday, at 8 o'clock, will be the last opportunity to see "Our Town," a human interest play about people. It is presented at the KUHS auditorium by the senior class under the direction of Genevieve Oppen.

The three-act play by Thornton Wilder uses no scenery and few and unusual stage properties but the layout of the town is so aptly described by Jim Kennett, stage manager, that it takes little imagination to see the picket fences, butternut tree, gardens and rural homes of Grover's Corners — Our Town.

Sound effects by Chuck Martin and Gene Peyton and lighting effects by Leroy Lofdash and Wayne Carothers, assist the audience in visualizing the sleepy little town's days and nights and lives and loves. Play manager is Charles Blackstone.

Superb pantomiming by the cast brings the audience into the homey scenes along the shaded street, where coffee is ground for break-

fast and hearty meals are cooked on old wood ranges.

Costumes for the cast, designed by Margaret Bullard, Ruth Landry and Yvette Sweet, take one back to the pre-automobile period.

The play is full of pathos and humor and is packed with everyday incidents of the average life. The unusual method of narration as the play proceeds, lines spoken from various parts of the auditorium, the unique finale, all make for an evening of entertainment that shouldn't be missed.

Production Up Urged In Talk

PORTLAND, May 15 (AP)—Earl Bunting, president of the National Association of Manufacturers and a former Portlander, last night urged "management and labor to stop bickering" and get to work on production.

In an address delivered to the regional NAM meeting of Oregon and Southwest Washington members, Bunting declared:

"National teamwork is what we've got to establish. All that we have in this country came from it! . . .

"People want management and labor to stop bickering and get back to the job of producing peacetime goods, jobs and services that are better than ever before. They want business to stop shying at every shadow on the road to American progress."

"The people want American workers to pitch in and build America too—they want labor to get over its growing pains and stop playing

cops and robbers all over the economic system," he said.

Walter B. Weisenburger, NAM executive vice president, said "atomic doom isn't going to overtake this country, but human dumbness can."

Union Fight Closes Mill

FOREST GROVE, May 15 (AP)—The Atlas Logging company operation at Glendale was closed today in a dispute with CIO loggers over dismissal of a timber feller.

Ott Keller, business agent of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, said the 200 loggers quit work after the company refused to reconsider the dismissal. Workers gave the company five days to reconsider, and then walked out, the spokesman said.

Roy Gould, president of the firm, was not available for comment.

VOTED OUT

ROSEBURG, May 15 (AP)—Property owners have rejected by a vote of 430 to 297 a school district tax levy proposal of \$176,428.48 above the six per cent limitation.
Election officials said the ballot yesterday was one of the largest ever cast in the school district.

Many Perlite Claims Filed

ALTURA, May 15—Prospectors are staking out and filing claims on large deposits of perlite found throughout the county.

Perlite is said to be a volcanic ash and many are the claims being made for its use. When subjected to intense heat it expands, like the popping of corn, and makes an excellent insulation material. It is light in weight as well as fireproof.

Processed, it is claimed synthetic marble can be made from it as well as nylon and brake lining.

An immense deposit near Look-out, in the form of sand, contains 80 per cent perlite and 40 per cent pumice. A brick plant has been set up on the property and building brick is being manufactured. The brick made from six parts of the deposit to one part cement is said to far surpass the FHA building requirements.

Lake Chamber Eyes Airline

Lakeview chamber of commerce is hopeful that Southwest Airways will include Lakeview as a proposed stop in its application for a permit to start air service from Medford to Reno via Klamath Falls.

Jack Mayne, manager of the Lakeview chamber, has asked the help of the Klamath chamber of commerce in Lakeview's effort to win air service through this project.

Southwest has an application pending before the CAB which includes Alturas as a stop, but not Lakeview. Mayne pointed out that Lakeview has a fine airport, and would make a logical stop without much extra mileage on the proposed route.

The matter has been referred to the Klamath chamber of commerce aviation committee.
