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Teamsters Call Mass Meeting
PORTLAND, Ore., May 16 (AP)—AFL teamsters called a mass meeting for tonight to discuss the next move in a dispute that has tied up 66 drayage and warehouse firms here.

Employers rejected their latest proposal for ending the strike—a proposal that an employer spokesman said would have given the teamsters a \$1 daily increase retro-

active to March 1, plus another 10-cent daily increase in September.

The spokesman, J. M. Scudder, said employers were not willing to offer more than 80 cents.
