

## Kiwanians To Start Park Work

Thirty Kiwanians tonight, Friday, will lay aside white collars and don overalls for a trick at manual labor. Armed with picks, shovels and other implements the men will start initial work of smoothing surface of the ground at the Kiwanis Recreational park, to get it in shape for planting grass seed sometime next week.

The primary objective of work on the park this year is to turf the entire area and complete a softball court.

The property chosen is a square block in Mills addition bordered by Reclamation, Mitchell, Division and Applegate streets, and the name "Kiwanis Recreational Park" has been approved by the city.

**Belong To City**  
All improvements will belong to the city and facilities will be available to all the youth desiring to make use of them. During two months in the summer season the Kiwanis club will supervise a play program.

The club has outlined a five-year plan with an expenditure of \$10,000 to cover all the improvements necessary to make a complete play ground. Several public spirited citizens have inquired about assisting financially. John Van Doren, chairman of the Kiwanis youth service committee, advised, and any such assistance will be extremely welcome, he said.

"Every little bit of help received, whether monetary, time or labor, will rush the project to a desirable early completion," Van Doren said.

**Contributions**  
Already unsolicited contributions of \$500 have been received, the chairman reported, and Dr. George A. Massey has pledged \$100 per year for the five years' work outlined in the original plan.

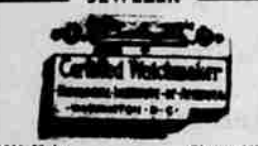

None of the eight men who did the work is a club member.

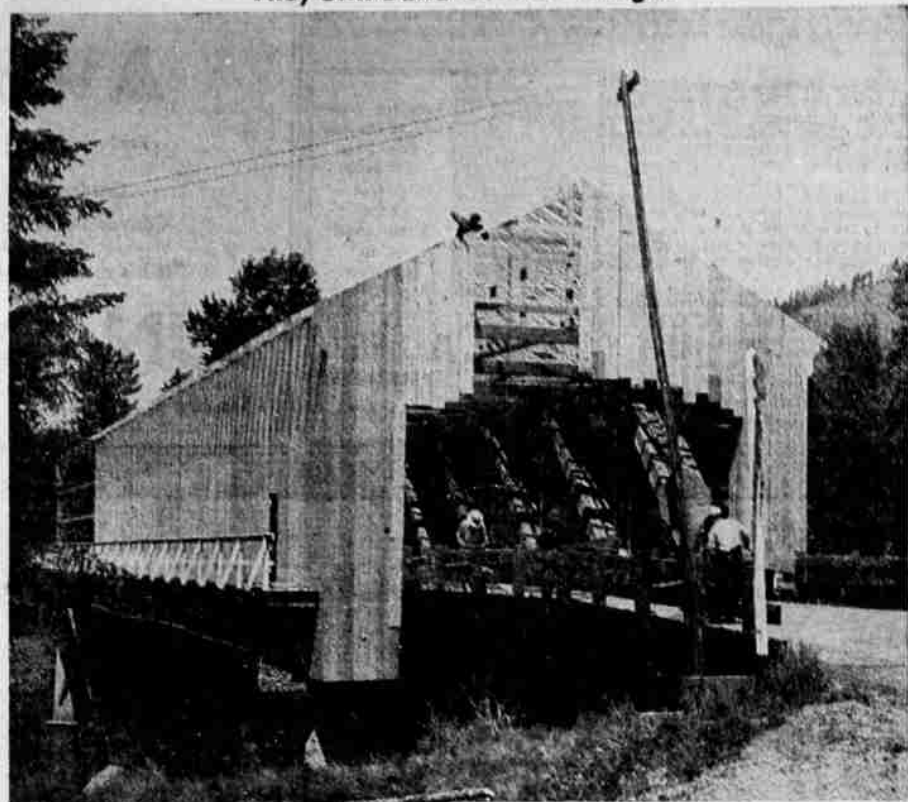
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## They Still Build Covered Bridges

## Truman Lifts USBR Ceiling

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—President Truman today informed Senator Wherry (R-Neb.) that he does not believe it "necessary or desirable" to restrict the spending of reclamation bureau funds in the year starting July 1 as was done in the present fiscal year.

The president's letter was in reply to a letter from Wherry on May 2 which questioned Mr. Truman's authority to impose expenditure ceilings on the reclamation bureau. Wherry also asked whether a similar curb on the use of appropriated funds would be clamped on next year. He said the senate subcommittee on interior department appropriations which he heads considered it "highly important" to know the answer before approving reclamation funds.

Mr. Truman's reply said that the ceiling action of last August was "within the well-recognized authority of the president" under the war mobilization and reconversion act. Last fall Mr. Truman imposed a \$130,000,000 ceiling on construction

activities of the reclamation bureau for 1947.

Any increase in the 1947 ceiling at this time, the president wrote the senator, would not result in heavier spending this fiscal year because of the time involved in getting heavy construction started.

LA GRANDE, May 16 (AP)—Wallowa lake lodge was formally opened for the 1947 season yesterday when representatives from La Grande, Union, Elgin, Joseph, Portland, and Baker chamber of commerce gathered at the lake for the ceremonial opening of the primitive area lodge.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 16 (AP)—Production of Idaho white, ponderosa and sugar pine increased last week, the Western Pine association reported today.

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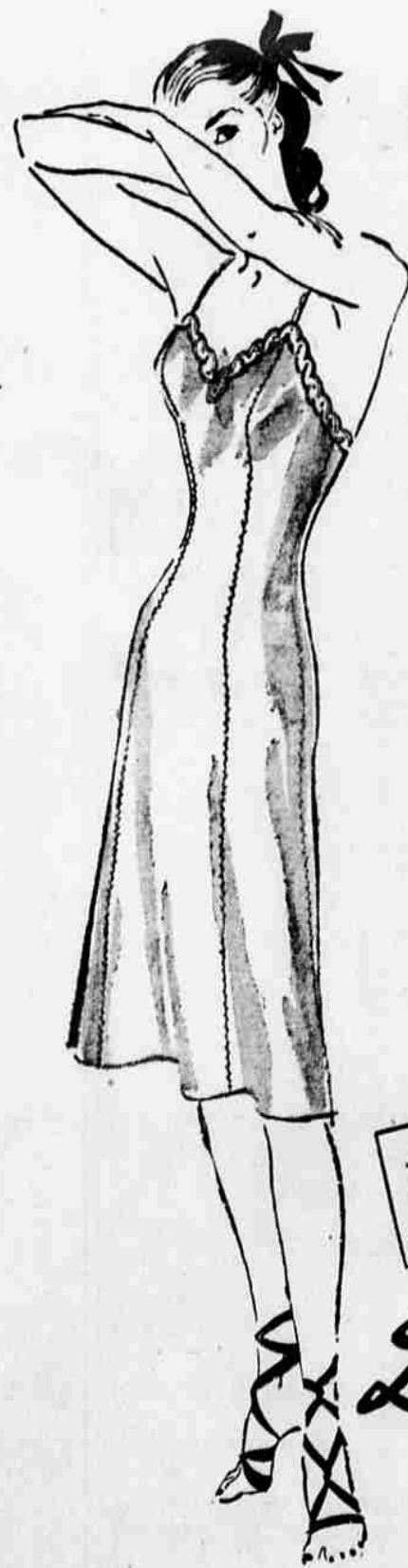
