

## Raw-Nerved Infantrymen Stage Huge Maneuvers

YAKIMA, May 10 (AP)—Their tempers sharpened by a stiff wind that stung them with needle-like particles of dust, 4500 second infantry division troops swarmed over the dune hills at the nearby Yakima firing range yesterday in the continuing second phase of a three-way training program which will conclude in Alaska this fall and winter.

The men trained under the sharp eye of the visiting sixth army commander, Maj. Gen. George P. Hays, who said the skeletal force was the largest active army unit in the United States today—which leaves

the nation, to all practical purposes, absolutely defenseless on land.

A few months ago, some of the same troops took part in the first phase of the training program—ambitious landing exercises on the sandy beaches of California.

This second phase revealed paradoxical contradictions today as some gun commanders—those with the new recoilless weapons—carefully rationed ammunition "because it is so scarce," while tank battalion commanders fired hundreds of rounds freely, fed by a tremendous reserve of unused shells manufactured for use against Japanese and Germans.

The shortages are felt almost acutely in manpower, Gen. Hays said, as the division is hampered by a high turnover of enlisted personnel, losing some 800 a month via the discharge route.

Thus the majority of those trained in California have already departed; a large portion of those being trained here will be mustered out by the time the first of five companies leaves for third phase operations in Alaska in November.

The maneuvers, begun here on a large scale last week, are scheduled to continue through next week, culminating in regular war games.
