**YAKIMA, May 17 (AP)**—Eight acceptances, and only one rejection, have been received from among the 28 winners of Rosa homestead units at a bureau of reclamation drawing last month. O. W. Lindgren, chairman of the board of examiners, said today.

Sam A. Hubbard, Tillamook, Ore., who drew unit No. 20, turned the offer down and the first alternate, Gerald R. Gray, Port Townsend, will be notified he is eligible for it, Lindgren said. The farm consists of 60 acres of general farm land four miles north of Prosser.

The other 19 winners were all certified as eligible at the review of the winning applications after the drawing, but none have notified the board yet of their decisions.

**Baccalaureate Speaker**—President Elmo Stevenson of Southern Oregon college will give the baccalaureate address at Bonanza May 22.

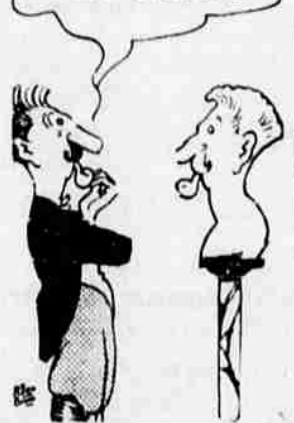

They then took his money, watch and sun-glasses, which amounted to around \$100, and ordered him out into his car, having obtained the keys already. Due to the fact that the timekeeper was coming in flashed a light on them and recognized Jack and his car the convicts became more desperate. When the timekeeper refused to unlock the gate they threw rocks at him and took the gate off its hinges. They knew he would give the alarm so they had to make a run for it, choosing the route over Pandango pass, on down through Surprise valley, maintaining a high rate of speed and beating the road

blockade below Cedarville about three minutes. They stole gas along the way and via Gerlock, Nevada, went on into Reno, traveling at times up to 104 miles an hour.

At a busy intersection in Reno the cops left the car and their hostage pronto, while the car was still in motion and Jack, now untaped, scrambled into the front seat to get his car under control. He immediately reported the facts at a police station, and soon had to undergo about a nine-hour questioning by FBI's and policemen.

Jack drove home on Tuesday after obtaining some money from officers with which to buy gas. Jack said he had always wanted to see Reno but he never dreamed of seeing it with a convict chauffeur and two convict escorts, in his own car. Jack is a member of the East Side Youth club and told his harrowing experience to members at their meeting last Tuesday evening at the Grange hall.
