OUR nomination for a new name for South Sixth street: KIT CARSON BOULEVARD.

The name honors one of the famous and romantic figures of the history of the American West, known to every American school child.

We have gone all out in this area in honoring the name of John C. Fremont—applying it to a school, a bridge, a street, and so on.

It almost looks as if the name Kit Carson had been saved for some special purpose. Here is an opportunity for South Sixth streeters to appropriate it for their commendable purpose—to give their fine, widened, modern boulevard a new and distinctive name.

History ON the 1846 expedition, the Fremont party with Carson as scout came up from Tule lake to Eulaulona Indian village at the approximate site of the modern Fremont bridge over Link river.

A few nights later, when camped on the west side of the Upper lake at Denny creek, the Fremont party was attacked by Indians. That was the night after Fremont had received information from the messenger from Washington, Lieut. A. H. Gillespie of the marine corps.

As for Carson's earlier visit: a few years ago, the late George Stephenson of Lakeview wrote us, suggesting that we run centennial anniversary excerpts from the Fremont journal of the 1843 expedition, which took him through the northern part of Klamath county.

Certainly, the name of the boulevard would catch the attention of the visitor, and would direct interest

to one of the colorful chapters in the history of our region.

Credit BEFORE we go further, we want to give personal credit for the suggestion of Kit Carson Boulevard. Riding out South Sixth yesterday, talking about the proposed change of names, Hale Scarborough and this scribe got to exploring regional history for ideas.

We respectfully submit that the name would add greatly to South Sixth as an asset to the entire community.

Battleship Oklahoma Sinks

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17 (AP)—The battleship Oklahoma went down for the last time today.

The once mighty survivor of a sinking in the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor plunged to the bottom of the sea in a 100-foot sea off Honolulu in an area of the Pacific approximately three miles deep.

Abandoned by the navy as a fighting ship, the 33-year-old vessel was under tow to an Oakland, Calif., drydock company for scrapping.

The Oklahoma, launched March 23, 1914, had been reported earlier as listing badly and Young Brothers, Ltd., Honolulu agency which handled her purchase for scrap, had ordered the tugs Hercules and Monarch, who had the ship under tow, to return to Pearl Harbor rather than try to make the mainland.

Little of the Oklahoma's former might remained for her last voyage. Her superstructure, including her anti-aircraft batteries, her 14-inch guns and 16 5-inch guns, was gone.

Much of her machinery, however, including boilers remained intact.

Torpedoed from the air in the Japanese air attack at Pearl Harbor, the Oklahoma turned turtle in shallow water. She was righted and floated in May, 1943, and rebuilt.

Her sister ship, the Nevada, was torpedoed and bombed in the same disastrous action but succeeded in beaching herself and later was refitted.

The Moore Drydock company of Oakland had purchased the Oklahoma as junk for \$40,000 and planned to begin reducing her to scrap in June.
