

Sons Batter Cubs, 11-6

Nineteen Hit Barrage Grets First Visiting League Foe; Fran Miller Goes Entire Route

Jumping off to a two-run bulge in the opening frame, the Klamath Sons yesterday afternoon drubbed the Redding Cubs 11 to 6 before a sizeable opening day crowd at Recreation field. It was the first home game of the Northern California league this season, and the Sons made the most of it by banging out 19 hits off two Redding pitchers. Eight of the 19 blows went for extra sacks.

The Sons were never out of the lead. To the initial pair of runs they added three more in the second and two each in the third, fifth and eighth. Redding went hitless and scoreless before the lefthanded pitching of Fran Miller until the fourth frame, and finally nicked Miller for nine bingles.

Big blow of the afternoon was Mario Pisan's inside-the-park home run to the wall in deep right center. Mario, who is the fastest man on the Klamath team, zipped all the way around to score behind Earl Brooks and Miller, beating the throw-in closely.

Only a moment before Miller had lambasted one over the right field wall—foul by a couple of feet.

To get the Sons first two runs in the opening frame, Pisan doubled, Tug Tognoli pounded out a triple and Earl Hatfield doubled to left. In the second the Redding pitcher, Ernie Masocovich, was being pounded unmercifully again, but he was relieved and Jim O'Neill went to the mound shortly after Pisan's homer. Masocovich, allowing five runs, was the loser.

When Redding finally did start touching Miller he had several shaky moments, but mostly because he gave up eight walks. Three of them came in the fourth frame, but only one resulted in a run. In that stanza the bases were loaded and Floyd Shoywell came in to pitch. He pitched to Klamath bullpen before Jim Rizzi, Cub third sacker, ended the threat by popping out.

Another Redding run came across in the fourth when Bob Childress doubled and Dave Machen, Cub cleanup hitter, produced a single. From then on until the eighth the Californians couldn't score.

In the eighth Art Corrella lead off with a triple to right, and came home when Ed Pope missed a throw-in of Mike Kassis' fielders choice grounder. A moment later Bill Markwick singled to right and Kassis was caught at third trying to stretch from first, then Ernie Masocovich came through with his attempt to salvage the game with a double, scoring Markwick. Two hits and a long fly produced the final Redding tally.

Lefties Strangle Cardinals

Some have called it a slump. Others have called it just "a slow start."

But it was apparent today that the trouble with the world champion St. Louis Cardinals is that the rest of the National league has been ganguing up on them with an orthodox barrage of lefthanded pitchers.

Including their double defeat by the Philadelphia Phillies yesterday—which incidentally sunk them deeper into the cellar, seven full games off the pace—the frustrated Redbirds have been beaten by southpaws 11 times this season against only two wins against portside pitching.

In 27 games, rival managers have started lefthanders against them 18 times and on 14 occasions were rewarded with victories. One game ended in a tie and the Cards won the other three. That is a far cry from last year when the Redbirds won 36 games from lefthanders against only 24 defeats for a percentage of 60 that was just 28 points off their season's average.

After Ken Henselman, ex-Pirate, beat the cards to nine hits in the opener to beat them 9-3, Ken Rainsberger blanked the Cards through 12 innings to win the nightcap 1-0.

Lefties retained their half game edge over the New York Giants by spitting a doubleheader with the reds in Cincinnati, winning the second game behind Red Barrett, 3-1 after Zwell Blackwell of the Reds had outpitched Mort Cooper in the opener 2-1.

After the Pittsburgh Pirates had overcome a 6-1 New York lead in the opener to win 7-6, the Giants came back to take the abbreviated seven-inning nightcap 11-6 to retain second place.

The Dodgers ended a skein of 19 scoreless innings by allowing four times in the seventh to down the Cards 4-2 before a record Chicago crowd of 46,572 paid admissions.

Stacy Feller made his first start of the season at Yankee Stadium a success by turning back the New York Yankees 5-3, gaining his fifth victory against three setbacks.

Scoring two runs in the ninth inning of each game, the Chicago White Sox took the measure of Washington's Senators twice in the Capital City, 4-2 and 3-2.

Philadelphia's surprising Athletics moved into sixth place, only four and a half games behind the first place Detroit Tigers, by trimming the St. Louis Browns twice at Shibe park, 4-3 and 5-2.

Portland Regains 3rd Spot

The Seattle Rainiers were the talk of the Pacific Coast league today. Riding to two shutout victories over the hard-bitting Sacramento Solons yesterday, 6-0 and 1-0 the Rainiers wound up with a 6-1 margin in the series, the first they've won this season.

It ran Seattle's winning streak to five straight—longest for the northerners in two years—and seemed to serve notice to the other clubs that Jo-Jo White finally has his veteran club squared away and out of the cellar "for good."

The double calamity job was served up by Kewpie Dick Barrett and Sig Jakucki. The aging right-handers gave up seven hits between them in 16 innings.

The results left the Rainiers in a fairly solid seventh place, two and one-half games ahead of the Hollywood Stars who ran their losing string to eight straight—season's worst—before finally winning the first game of a twin bill from league-leading San Francisco, 9-1. The Stars' Xavier Hescagno bested Bob Joyce.

The Seals, behind another slick pitching job by young Bob Cheames, bounced back to take the nightcap, 4-1, and hung up another 1-0 series shut. It was Cheames' ninth win for the loop—against two defeats.

The Angels came a cropper in Casey Stengel's bustling Oaks and lost their first series of the year, four games to three. After Ray Prim's six-hitter gave the Angels the opener, 5-2, the Oaks' Dewey Soriano shaded Red Linn in a 1-0 duel. The win enabled the Stengels to shoulder their way into the first division for the first time, a half-game ahead of fifth-place San Diego.

San Diego—as have all visitors at Portland—had a tough week with the Beavers, splitting a final twin bill and coming out on the short end of a 5-2 series count. Ed Vitalech twisted the Padres to a five-hit, 5-2 decision in the first game, but the Beavers rallied behind Jack Salvestro to run 6-7 with the finale, 9-4.

The Beavers thus found themselves in third place, four games back of the Seals. If they could approximate their home pace while on the road, the Oregonians would be topping the circuit. At home, they've won 18, lost 10. On the road, the Beavers have nabbed only seven while dropping 12.

Pels Finish Fourth; Hornets Win Class B

CORVALLIS, May 19—The Grants Pass Cavemen and Washington Colonials of Portland finished in a standoff for the Oregon high school track and field championship Saturday on Bell field, swinging what amounted to an upset victory over the favored squads, Medford and Klamath Falls.

The joint victors of the 21st annual cinder classic collected 16 points each. Medford ended up third with 15, and the Klamath Pelicans came in a pace behind at fourth, 14 points. Ashland trailed at 12, Cottage Grove 10, and Milton-Freewater 10.

As expected all the way around, Henley's Hornets grabbed off first place in class B smaller schools division with a landslide of 61 1/2 points, the 100 and 220-yard dashes and Mohawk third with 15 1/2. The Main Mustangs cornered 3 points.

The state "A" trophy went home with the Grants Pass outfit, won on a flip of a coin. A duplicate will be made up and presented to the Colonials later.

EUGENE, Ore., May 19 (AP)—The University of Oregon track and field athletes defeated Oregon State college, 79 to 82, here Saturday in a dual meet that signaled the official end of the 44-year career of Col. Bill Hayward at Oregon.

The veteran Olympic star coach will assume emeritus status at the campus next year.

One new dual meet record was posted when George Rasmussen, a freshman from Bend, vaulted to clear the bar at 14 feet, two inches. His mark broke the 14 feet 1/2 inch 1939 record of Rod Hansen of Oregon.

Dave Henthorne, Oregon freshman from Klamath Falls, won the 440 and ran the anchor position on the Webfoot team. Jake Leicht, football star who alternates with Henthorne as dash man on the enders, took over the 100 and 220 dashes.
