

# Condrey Urges Action On Canal Fencing; City Dads Consider Street Repairing

City Councilman A. F. Condrey last night that further investigation into the problem of making the canal safe by fencing along its banks, or other means, would require the action of the U. S. congress.

Condrey had advanced the suggestion at the last council meeting and reported that he had been studying the situation since then. In a talk with the bureau of reclamation man, he said, he had found that there were two ways to finance the project: First, through the farmers who use the water from the canal and would have to pay in increased water rate for any work done; or second, outright congressional appropriation.

He also reported that he had talked

with a number of persons who all seemed interested in the project and thought that all that was needed now was someone to head a campaign to secure congressional action. Condrey moved that the mayor be asked by the council to appoint a committee to act. The council agreed.

The council also moved to close the city hall Friday, May 30, Memorial Day, and the morning of May 31.

The matter of licensing coin-operated radio sets in the city, brought up at the last meeting, was again discussed, with Councilman Angus Newton reporting that the city of Portland charged a \$25 per agent and \$1 per receiver as license fee. Arthur Peterson, the operator who intends to install the sets in the city, read a letter which stated that \$10 was the maximum fee charged in most cities. He also pointed out the value the city would gain from the sets by tourists listening to local commercial advertisements. The matter was set aside for further study.

# Fire District Terms Drawn

Terms of the five newly elected directors of the Suburban fire district have been determined by drawing. The five-year term went to Cecil Prather, L. E. Judd will serve four years, Alva Lewis, three, Clyde Williams, two, and W. S. Metler will sit on the board for one year.

The directors meeting for the first of a semi-monthly meeting held Alva Lewis, president of the board, Cecil Prather, vice president and Clyde Williams, secretary and treasurer. The board will meet in the future the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at the Metler office on So. 6th and Altamont.

Next step in the program for fire protection for an area approximately twice the size of Klamath Falls will be plans for financing the district which has an approximate assessed property valuation of \$2,000,000.

The boundaries of the new district are from the city limits to the mile east of the Lakeview-Merrill junction, to Anderson street on the Merrill highway.

The board, now responsible for purchase of equipment has tentatively plans for buying two trucks to provide adequate protection and for property to house the equipment.

# Jap Soldiers Draw Prison

TOKYO, May 20 (AP)—U. S. eighth army has sentenced former Sgt. Torakichi Nakayama to four years at hard labor and ex-Cpl. Miki Karadachi to one year for mistreatment of Canadians at Oeyama prisoner of war camp near Osaka.

Nakayama was convicted of beating Lance Cpl. William A. Shayler, Vancouver, B. C., Sgt. Earl W. Dickie, 772 William Ave., Winnipeg, Manitoba, and Sgt. Howard G. Donnelly, 346 Ferry road, St. James municipality, Manitoba.

Karadachi was accused of beating Cpl. M. J. Olson, Somerset, Manitoba, and Pvt. Leon J. Paret, 258 Vertrand St., St. Boniface, Manitoba.

# Archbishop Urges Church Reform

LONDON, May 20 (AP)—Terming the canons of the church of England "antiquated, obscure and largely irrelevant," the archbishop of Canterbury said today he believed their revision "was the first and most essential step in the whole process of church reform."

The archbishop expressed his views in delivering his presidential address to the convocation of Canterbury, which tomorrow will receive a new report on canon law.

Meanwhile, the National Union of Protestants said in a statement that it "deplores the complete absence from the body of canons recommended in the report of the archbishop's commission, of any regulations that would restrain unlawful masses and other Romish practices now so much in evidence in our national church."
