## Solons Validate Marriages

SALEM, May 20 (AP)—The legislature validated all marriages entered into before next July 5 in which the parties were married without one of the parties having waited six months after a divorce. Attorney General George Neuner ruled today for the state department of veterans affairs.

The law, Neuner said, also makes legitimate all children of these marriages. Oregon law requires that divorced parties must wait six months before remarriage, but they have been many cases where the parties remarry before that time. So each legislature validates these marriages in order to make the children legitimate.

Six youths were injured.

Jackie Brunat, 8 year old girl, severe arm and leg burns from flaming gasoline which sprayed on her as she stood across the street from the playground.

Herbert Salome, 20, burned back and leg.

Allen Kelly, 15, head injury, burns and lacerations.

Lyle Lewis, 14, head and arm bruises.

## Texas City Ship Burns

TEXAS CITY, Tex., May 20 (AP)—Flames from the burning of the gasoline tanker Pan Massachusetts Sunday took the life today of Louis Homme, 40, of Galveston.

Homme was a crewman on the tug Richard Clarke, which caught fire from the Pan Massachusetts.

Flames from the tanker sent a spiral of smoke 4000 feet into the air and badly damaged the tanker, the tug and the dock and injured crewmen of both the tanker and tug.

Credit for extinguishing the four-hour fire went to Texas City's heroic volunteer fire department which lost 27 members in the fires and explosions that wrecked this waterfront town a month ago.

**Krug Urges Puerto Rican Rights**

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Krug urged congress today to give Puerto Rico the right to elect its own governor.

In a statement prepared for the house public lands committee, Krug said the right to elect a chief executive is a "minimum privilege" which should be "granted now as a token of our earnest intention to settle as soon as possible the more perplexing problem of permanent status."
