

Klamath Not On Western Air Route

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board says it was influenced by two important additions to the air transportation pattern in authorizing Western Air Lines to extend its flights northward from San Francisco to Seattle.

One addition was Western's authority to serve Mexico City. Its new northward extension to provide a route between Mexico City and the northwestern United States has obvious benefits, the agency said.

The other was United Air Lines' authority to fly between San Francisco and Honolulu. In the light of this authority, said the board, United "cannot be considered a fully neutral carrier for providing access to the three Pacific gateways by west coast passengers while Western, extended to Seattle would be fully independent because it operates no trans-Pacific service."

The board reopened the so-called "west coast case" to make its award to Western yesterday. Portland, Ore., was designated as the only intermediate point on the San Francisco-Seattle run.

Originally Western sought to make other stops, including Klamath Falls, Ore., but the board order said that "with respect to the other intermediate points, we find no basis for revising our original decision," which rejected Western's request.

A board official said the Klamath Falls stop "was not even considered" in the re-opened case. In its previous decision, the board gave the Klamath Falls stop to United, which is now operating service there.

JC's Plan Big Regatta

William Smith, city recreation director and Tom Milne, president of 20-30, were special guests at the meeting and Smith explained the recreational program he has in mind for Klamath Falls.

Growers Get Approval On Warehouses

TULELAKE, May 20—Approval of applications made by the Tulelake Potato Growers have been taken with the exception of one or two. Two hundred forty-nine have been completely removed, 311 are nearly cleaned up and another 400 are in the process of being moved or will be taken out in the near future. The bureau of reclamation is holding 250 for use of the next quota of homesteaders and still others for salvage for bureau use.

No more applications are being accepted at this time and in event some of those already applied for and allocated are not taken, public notices to that effect will be posted later.

Several applications are now on file waiting for approval.

The buildings have been scattered over wide areas in Siskiyou, Modoc and Klamath counties, most of them going into rural districts for housing. Churches, schools and other non-profit organizations also benefited by the allocations.

The well constructed buildings were used this last season for storage of grain and potatoes and will be used for that purpose in the future with preference given to needs of the new homesteaders and secondly to veterans holding lease lands.

The buildings, each with concrete loading docks, are built on the rail-way right of way and the growers will negotiate with the SP for leasing the land.

Thomas, in announcing the transfer of the warehouses stated that the reclamation bureau believed that the community could best be served by the disposition decided upon.

The acquisition gives a loading point close to many of the new homesteads.

Thomas also announced that all of the 423 buildings applied for by the California farm production

council have been taken and that the 200 applied for by the Klamath Potato Growers have been taken with the exception of one or two.
