Forest service men in this area have received quantities of magnesium material from the war department to be used in brush and snag burning when moisture conditions make ordinary burning difficult. They call the material "goop." It was used in incendiary bombs in the war, and part of the left-over supply has been distributed to the forest service. The above picture shows a Modoc fireman pouring water on burning goop. Water makes goop sputter and burn more intensely, as every wartime civilian defense worker knows.

Lakeview To Host Stockmen

Lakeview will play host this Thursday, Friday and Saturday to the State Cattle and Horse Raisers association, with 600 members expected to attend.

New brand laws of interest to all stockmen will be discussed at a three-day convention at Lakeview, May 22, 23 and 24, to go into effect July 1. A state brand inspection man approved by local stockmen will be appointed before July to be stationed permanently in this district. Proposed names for this position will be taken up at the session.
