

Cancer Fund Total Here Over \$2000

The Klamath county cancer fund had advanced to \$2039 today, after a spurt of giving accompanied by an end to the active phase of the cancer campaign.

Malcolm Epley, Klamath county chairman for the American Cancer society, said that contributions will be welcomed and it is hoped that enough money can be gathered together to make the county's \$2850 quota.

Epley thanked the 20-30 club, which conducted the active phase of the campaign. Tom Petty has been in charge of the effort for the club. Contributions may be sent to Epley at The Herald and News, and he will forward them to the American Cancer society headquarters at Portland.

Little Solicitation
"Much of the money already given has come in without personal solicitation," said Epley. "To all of you who have given, I want to express the appreciation of the 20-30 club and the American Cancer society. They have contributed to a worthy cause."

I am reluctant to report that Klamath county has not made its quota on the cancer drive, for I feel that there is real public support here for the program. Many people have just neglected to give, but not too late."

Epley emphasized that financial contributions are not the only way in which the Klamath public can help in the national campaign against cancer. Early detection and treatment of the disease can reduce its heavy toll, he said, and he urged all people here to inform themselves on the symptoms of cancer.

Recordings In Murder Case

LOS ANGELES, May 22 (AP)—The overall murder case of nearby Orange county accused a Los Angeles wife recording mystery today. Detectives summoned by defense counsel to the home of Fred Jungquist, uncle and guardian of Louise Overell, 18, heiress-defendant in the bizarre case, said they found two microphones and wires in the home and a recording device in a room of a nearby hotel.

Neither the authorities, Jungquist nor the defense attorney, Otto A. Jacobs, offered any theories as to why they might have placed the listening devices, or why.

Miss Overell and her fiancé, George Gollum, 21, are scheduled to go on trial Monday in Santa Ana on charges of murdering her wealthy parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Overell, who died aboard their dynamite-blasted yacht March 15. Jacobs announced yesterday that the couple would testify in their own behalf.

Convicted Slayer Dies In Cell

CHICAGO, May 22 (AP)—Julius (Dolly) Weisberg, a former Chicago night club owner and convicted slayer, who had lost all court appeals to escape death in the electric chair and who was to have been executed early Friday morning, died yesterday in his death cell, apparently from a heart attack.

Weisberg, 50, who was convicted a year ago of the slaying of an automobile salesman, died less than two hours after he was transferred to the death cell—about 25 feet from the electric chair.

Brooklyn Housewife Kills Woman

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—A frail Brooklyn housewife Wednesday shot and killed a pretty, brunette mother of two children she had befriended for two years, police said, and then was pointed out as the slayer by her own husband who had been named co-respondent in the dead woman's divorce suit.

Mrs. Margaret Jannazzo, 31, was killed by five revolver shots in a hallway off a busy Brooklyn street. Deputy Chief Inspector William T. Whalen said that as he and other police examined the body, Rocco Scavone pushed through a crowd gathered outside and told him his wife, Philomina, 41, mother of his three children, had shot Mrs. Jannazzo and was at that moment across the street in the crowd.

Dead Expression
Whalen said he went out with Scavone. They pushed through the crowd and finally Scavone paused and slowly pointed at his slight, 84-pound wife who was staring beyond the crowd with a dead expression. Taking Mrs. Scavone lightly by the arm, Whalen said he walked back to the hallway with her and they confronted the body of her former close friend, Mrs. Jannazzo. Then, Whalen stated, Mrs. Scavone said calmly:

"I'm now at peace with the world and my maker. I'm glad it's over." Mrs. Scavone took Mrs. Jannazzo and her two sons into her home two years ago, police said, and had constantly befriended her. A decree divorcing Mrs. Jannazzo from her war-wounded husband, Anthony, 38, in which Rocco Scavone was named as co-respondent, will be final May 31, police said.

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Ordinance, Hermiston On Route

ORDNANCE, Ore., May 22 (AP)—Housewives welded brooms and mops here Wednesday as millions of Mormon crickets threatened to strip this tiny community of the few green things residents worked so hard to grow.

The horde of hopping insects, advancing on a 12-mile front, were within 11 miles of Hermiston and endangered a large portion of Umatilla county's west end crops. Leroy E. Fuller, assistant county agent at Hermiston, reported.

The crickets, ranging in color from light green to tan and to black and in size up to two inches long, were eating practically everything green in their path and many women early today recalled husbands from jobs at the Umatilla ordinance depot to help combat the invaders.

Out Of Hand
Fuller, who described the crickets as "definitely out of hand," called for more volunteer poisoned bait spreaders and scoured the surrounding area for more trucks and equipment.

Crickets blackened U. S. highway 30 for two miles between Board and Ordinance yesterday, he reported. In places where the insects were most numerous the pavement was "greasy" with remains of thousands crushed by vehicles.

The infestation first was reported about two weeks ago in Morrow county but baiting with a poisoned bran-sawdust mixture didn't start until 10 days ago. Fuller estimated that bait spreading must continue for 30 days more at least.

B-29 Crew Member Found Dead In Tree

ABILENE, Tex., May 22 (AP)—The twentieth and last crew member of a B-29 which crashed Tuesday night in a tree 12 miles southwest of Merkel.

The victim's name was withheld by army authorities. "The B-29 caught fire and nine men others parachuted and were found. Several sustained injuries."

Woman Reports House Entered

Mrs. Jack Laine, 118 Martin, reported to city police yesterday afternoon that her house was entered sometime yesterday and several items of jewelry taken.

Missing articles include a wrist watch, a man's signet ring and a \$250 gold piece. Mrs. Laine said that the break-in apparently occurred during the morning while she was working at the rear of the house.

A hole had been cut in the front screen and the door unlatched.

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Smuggling Ring Said Working

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Rep. McDowell (R-Pa.) said today a house un-American activities subcommittee has uncovered evidence that a "ring" is sneaking communists from Mexico into the United States.

McDowell said the subcommittee also found "communism deeply entrenched in Hollywood and the movies."

"It was a highly successful trip," McDowell said. "Communism has gotten into the films. We are prepared to name the film and who got it in and how."

Mrs. Earhart Says Amelia Captured

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Mrs. Amy Otis Earhart, 79, of Boston, is convinced that her daughter, Amelia Earhart, was taken prisoner by the Japanese after her disappearance over the Pacific ocean in 1937.

Mrs. Earhart came here yesterday for a WOR radio interview and said her daughter, at the time of her round-the-world flight attempt, was on a government mission "so secret that it was even kept from me." She said she had not discussed her daughter's disappearance publicly before.

"I think my daughter landed and was taken prisoner of the Japs," Mrs. Earhart said. "I have letters, documents and messages addressed to me that convinced me thoroughly that she landed on land."

County Holds Budget In 6 Per Cent

\$150,000 over the 6 per cent limitation, and for a time it looked as if a vote would be required to authorize an excessive budget. However, the committee called upon reserves that were built up during the war, to the extent of \$148,000, and proceeded to cut out all tax levies for road purposes for the coming year.

Even with the tax income cut, the road budget will amount to \$300,000. The money will come from the forest service, \$50,000; state motor vehicle fund, \$195,000; gas tax refund, \$8000; justice court, \$6000; revolving fund, \$40,000. County court members said that an adequate maintenance program can be carried on, but not much construction. They recalled that voters had defeated a tax levy for road purposes at the last election.

Comparative Items

Here are some comparative items in the budget: Sheriff's office—Budgeted \$51,827; last year, \$48,000.

Clerk's office—Budgeted \$41,830. Last year, \$31,000. Main increase is in elections costs, there being two elections scheduled in the coming fiscal year.

Assessor's office—\$18,120; last year, \$15,110. Public employees retirement—\$60,000; nothing last year.

District attorney—\$6880; last year, \$6110. County veterans service—\$3500; last year, nothing. New function.

Treasurer—\$5400; last year, \$5400. School superintendent—\$1620.00; last year, \$2436.40.

County court—\$21,170; last year, \$17,535. Health department—\$31,877; last year, \$29,637.

Circuit court—\$9400; last year, \$9600. County schools—\$276,108.63; last year, \$261,964.88.

Welfare—\$50,250; last year, \$36,750. Reduction in state funds for welfare purposes necessitated raising the county appropriation, the committee said.

Surveyor—\$400; last year, \$650. The committee inserted an item of \$65,000 in the budget to take care of losses from payment of discounts to taxpayers who make advance tax payments.

Canada Seeks Increased Trade

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 22 (AP)—Hope for an increased volume of trade between Canada and New Zealand was signified here today by J. A. Malcolm, New Zealand trade commissioner to Canada.

In an address prepared for delivery to the fifth national foreign trade conference, Mr. Malcolm said that the volume of New Zealand trade with Canada "makes us a customer worthy of attention and as time goes on there should undoubtedly be opportunities for the increase of reciprocal trade."

"We have a customs tariff not unfavorable to Canada. We have an important control system which, while not satisfying all our traders, has acted as a buffer against reckless importing at inflated prices at a time when care should be taken to avoid being swamped with unnecessary articles which might affect our stabilization plans."
