

Solon Hurls Charge Over Spud Waste

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Rep. August H. Andresen (R-Minn.) accused the agriculture department today of "wanton destruction of potatoes" while potatoes are being imported from Canada at high prices.

"While department of agriculture agents pour kerosene on huge piles of new potatoes in Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia, and other southern states," Andresen told the house, "potatoes come in from Canada to supply those markets, and at higher prices for consumers already staggering under the cost of living."

Bills of Lading

Andresen said he has in his possession bills of lading showing that potatoes "are being imported for sale in the very territory where farmers are being paid not to harvest their crops."

Since July, 1946, the government has bought 67,000,000 bushels of potatoes at a net cost of \$80,000,000, to carry out the price support program, Andresen said, and "of this gigantic purchase 22,000,000 bushels were destroyed."

Andresen urged President Truman, "when he envisions against the high cost of living, to tell the people about the impact on prices that buying for foreign markets has had on prices paid by American consumers."

Baiting On For Squirrels

Baiting of county and state lands for control of Oregon ground squirrels is in full swing, according to Harold Schieferstein, county weed and pest control supervisor.

Schieferstein said that specially prepared squirrel baits of poisoned oats are available to land owners through the county agent's office and stores throughout the county.

Squirrels cause considerable damage to crops. Known also as sage rats and pocket gophers, these rodents are unique from a habit standpoint. Although very active at this season they disappear completely in late summer when they go below ground to hibernate till the next spring.

Baits distributed in spoonful amounts at entrance to holes are very effective at this season.

Ground squirrels are capable of carrying and spreading bubonic plague. Control and eradication is desirable from the standpoint of public health as well as saving of crop losses.

Except in a few small areas ground squirrels in Klamath county are less numerous by far than in earlier days. A systematic baiting campaign is carried on each year.

Gopher Damage On Increase

Pocket gopher damage to crops and fields seems greater this spring than usual and numerous requests for control information are being received at the county agent's office.

The office carries strychnine supplies for use in making up baits of diced carrots. Carrots cut into pieces 1 1/2 inches long and 1/2 inch square are dusted with strychnine. Four quarts of cut carrots can be dusted sufficiently with 1/4 oz. of strychnine.

A probe is used to locate tunnels near mounds thrown up by the gophers. Two or three pieces of poison bait dropped into each tunnel are very effective in reducing the gopher populations. Bait should be stood on end in the burrow, if possible.

Bulletins on pocket gopher control are available at the county agent's office.

Modoc Fair Secretary Quits

ALTURAS, May 22—John Griswold, elected last year as secretary-manager of the Modoc county fair, turned in his resignation to the board of directors at its last meeting held in Cedarville. The resignation is effective July 1.

Milan Briles, native Alturas now residing in Cedarville, where he operates the Briles Farm Equipment company, was selected to take over the duties of Griswold.

The fair will be held in Cedarville September 5, 6 and 7.

Guest Speaker At Church

Frank Traylor, pastor of the Oak Park Church of Christ, Sacramento, Calif., and former army chaplain, will be guest speaker at the Klamath Falls Church of Christ, 2205 Wantland, at 7:30 p. m., Friday.

Traylor was a chaplain in the famed 41st "Sunset" division during the war and saw extensive overseas service. He will tell of the missionary work in the Orient and Pacific islands, as well as giving a first-hand account of the desolation of Hiroshima where his regiment was among the first to arrive after the atom bomb. On display will be a number of souvenirs he has collected from the Orient.

He will come here as part of a speaking tour of Oregon, which includes appearances this week in Grants Pass, Cottage Grove, Salem and Klamath Falls.

Good Weather Speeds Work

Favorable weather conditions this year have resulted in more work accomplished by the U. S. soil conservation service in Langell valley than in any previous year at this time.

District equipment has been used to level approximately 250 acres since January 1. RCS technicians have carried on complete topographic surveys and have staked the land for leveling. This includes ripping and landplaning as well as establishing new irrigation systems on this land.

Draughts have been installed which affect approximately 300 acres. Albert E. Everts, irrigation engineer, will report for duty June 15. He is being transferred to Klamath Falls from Yerington, Nev., and will be in charge of the planning for leveling and drainage work in Langell valley district.

Applications for work on hand indicate there will be approximately 500 acres of land to level immediately following harvest.

At the regular monthly meeting of Langell valley district, held May 14, Charles Partridge was elected chairman of the board of supervisors, replacing R. R. Davis, who has resigned. Mrs. Partridge is the new secretary, replacing Mrs. Pettigrew.
