By MALCOLM EPLEY THE county budget as completed yesterday provides another \$67,000 for the city-county jail.

This makes a total of \$167,000 the county has provided for this dual-purpose institution, while the city's scheduled total for the jail is \$92,000.

Alfred Collier, member of the budget committee, said he believes there may be a brief-lived decline in such costs, and that they will thereafter rise again.

At any rate, it seems to us that the city and county should not undertake the jail project at the present high level of costs.

The city-county jail enterprise is a worthy one, and we were among the first to advocate it.

By waiting for more favorable building costs, it may be possible to use the sum available for both construction and equipment, without additional outlays for the latter purpose.

Who Wrote It?

AL's Bill Green has been saying the reform bills were written by the National Association of Manufacturers and hot (as the bills says) to "prescribe fair and equitable rules of conduct" for both unions and management.
