Woman Files Damage Suit

Mrs. Hazel Mundlin, 52, of 3125 Boardman, has brought a damage suit against Klamath Valley hospital for \$5000, asking that amount in payment for injuries assertedly received while she was employed as a nurse's helper at the hospital almost two years ago.

In her complaint, filed this morning with the circuit clerk, Mrs. Mundlin states she was permanently injured when she fell down a flight of stairs in the hospital building in the course of her work.

She says that the fall, taking place September 4, 1945, injured her right shoulder and arm and left hand and made it impossible for her to work since that time.

Local Vet Faces Eviction

A World War II veteran's name was brought into the United States district court at Portland today when the federal housing administration filed eviction papers against Clarence R. "Dick" Adreon, whose family resides in the Mountain View homes, FHA unit at the end of Main street.

Herman Hahner, assistant U. S. district attorney, filed suit charging young Adreon with failure to pay rent since January and asks restitution of the premises and judgment for \$195 back rent.

At least four other tenants in the project, all ex-servicemen, have been sent notices for failure to pay rent, the Portland office advised.

Adreon, now a student at Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, made application for the two-bedroom apartment May 22, 1946, and moved in June 4, 1946, according to available records. Adreon's sisters, Carol and Phyllis, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Adreon Sr., also occupied the unit. At that time Adreon was employed as a member of the state highway department extra gang crew.

Records show that Adreon paid rent up until November 26, 1946, and then made up the December rent on February 14. No payments have been made since that time, according to records. Eviction will come from the U. S. district attorney's office and Adreon will not be permitted to pay back rent to the local FHA office but must make restitution to the Portland office.

Names of the other rent-arrear residents were not given.

Battleship Iowa Arrives in SF

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22 (AP)—The super battleship Iowa steamed through the Golden Gate early today to lead the first large concentration of naval warships to San Francisco bay since wartime.

Flying the three-starred flag of Vice Admiral Alfred E. Montgomery, the Iowa is flagship of the first task fleet, 29 ships, including a flotilla of submarines, destroyers, cruisers and supply train.

The fleet visit is a part of Naval Reserve Week in San Francisco.
