Air Tour Week

No More Navions
North American Aviation, Inc. has announced the production of the Navion, its four-place passenger plane, has been discontinued. The reason for discontinuing this model was given as that demand for this particular craft had not come up to expectations.

Flying Their Investigator
Many cattle missing in spring roundup which were believed by owners to be stolen, have shown up from an aerial survey of the territory to be nesting in pockets in the hills where they apparently strayed during the winter months.

C. B. Liechty, state livestock theft investigator, Klamath Falls, finds many such small bunches of cattle contentedly grazing in hidden coulees, as he flies over the mountainous areas, unaware that they missed roll call. Ranchers have taken the air too, lately, using planes to locate missing cattle and move them toward the home corrals.

Roundup-from-the-sky methods have been used successfully on wild horses in the Owyhee river country on the Oregon and Idaho border, stampeding them out of the hills in air and chasing them into prepared pens.

Further flight checks were made Tuesday on the Tilmann navigator, using the small production size. Wind drift was estimated on the flight over to Bly by Penny Payne in an Ercoupe and the return trip was calculated by the instrument on the same windage.
