## Students Win Music Awards

Six Klamath Union high school music department students received gold Master Musicians' keys for outstanding work. 20 were presented with "K" letters, and 60 with silver music lyre pins, in a presentation made Thursday morning by Andrew Loney Jr., director of music education in the city schools. The keys are given on the basis of 5000 points, the "K"s on 3000, and the pins on 1000. Merits, as outlined by Loney, are as follows: one week's technique, 30; concert band or marching band performance, 30; ensemble performance, 60; solo, 90; student director per year, 100; librarian per year, 100; secretary per year, 50.

Thomas by Special Indian Officer John Arkell after the mother of the girl made a juvenile hearing probably Monday before Federal Judge James Alger Fee, now holding federal court in Medford. U. S. Marshal Paul Hanlon of Medford took the two youngsters into custody here.

C., stating that they would be stopping over in Klamath Falls the night of June 18, and would like the opportunity to play a concert here that night. Stark said that he had replied to their letter saying that the chamber would cooperate in arranging for the band concert and securing housing for the group. He has not yet received a reply.
