Committee To Probe Potato Flour

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—The house rules committee approved today a resolution authorizing the house agriculture committee to investigate the possibility of eliminating the nation's annual potato surplus by converting it into flour.

The action came after Rep. Shaffer (R-Mich.) declared that \$80,000,000 in government subsidy payments would have been saved if the 1946 surplus of more than 100,000,000 bushels had been converted into baking flour.

Texas City Damage Toll \$32 Million

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—An official report issued here today on the Texas City, Tex., disaster listed total property damage at an estimated \$32,850,000 and said 433 bodies had been recovered with 135 persons still missing.

The report was issued by the fire prevention and engineering bureau of Texas and the national board of fire underwriters.

Texas City, a community 10 miles north of Galveston, was ripped and seared by a series of explosions and fire last April 16-17.

The report said the \$32,850,000 damage estimate included loss to industrial property of \$28,100,000 plus an additional \$4,750,000 damage to dwellings and contents, mercantile buildings and stocks, automobiles, and city and school property.

Strawberry Crop Faces Big Loss

SALEM, May 23 (AP)—Strawberry growers south of Salem predicted today they would lose two-thirds of their crops unless rain comes within a week.

Prune and cherry growers said the heat wave already has caused them considerable damage.

Frank R. Nichols, president of the Nichols Wire and Steel company, said that because there is an ample supply of aluminum wire and an acute scarcity of steel wire his firm had begun production of aluminum

bale ties and would be willing to furnish the wire to other bale tie manufacturers.
