So. 6th Gets Final Touches

Only a little hand labor remains to be done before Warren Northwest Inc., contract holders on the S. 6th street job, wind up their one-year program. The contract with the state of Oregon was for \$362,000 and work was started a little over a year ago, May 20, 1946.

Traffic control markers, those little gadgets marching down the middle of the highway, were completed, all 280 of them, late Thursday and they'll be painted yellow next week. The markers are spaced every 10 feet in blocks north of Washburn way and are placed along the stretch by being "tamped in," highway men explained. The markers are of asphaltic concrete.

The islands, all 10 of them, are now paved with reflectors and traffic control lights on each end.

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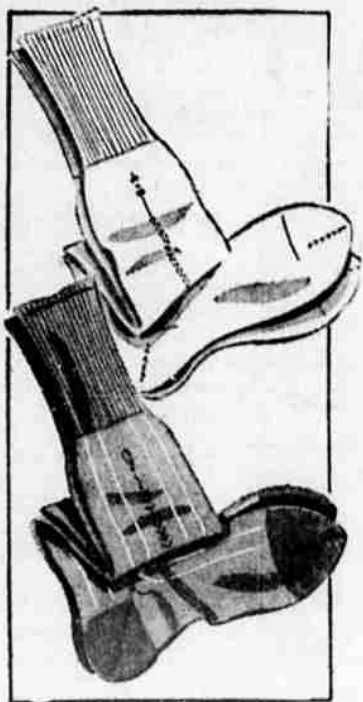
