Of these, about 265 were school children, while the others were adults. A year ago there were only 269 X-rays made altogether.

Two Vacancies At Annapolis

Congressman Lowell Stockman has announced that he will have two vacancies at the U. S. naval academy at Annapolis, Md., to be filled with boys from the second district of Oregon for the class beginning July 1, 1948. The selection of nominees will be conducted by the civil service commission on competitive examinations to be held July 31, 1947.

Applicants must be residents of State Vice President A. E. Lucas of Oregon and should be high school seniors, or graduates of high school, or college students, and in perfect physical condition.

Candidates for the naval academy must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 21 years of age on April 1st of the calendar year (1948) in which they enter the naval academy unless the candidate has completed one year of honorable service in any of the armed forces of the United States during World War II, in which case he may enter the academy if he is not more than 23 years of age on April 1st of the calendar year in which he enters the naval academy.

All boys who are interested and qualified should write immediately to Congressman Lowell Stockman, House Office building, Washington, D. C., so they may receive additional information and be admitted to the examination.
