

Soviets End Capital Punishment

LONDON, May 27 (AP)—A Moscow broadcast announcing abolition of the death penalty in the Soviet Union was acclaimed today by Russian sources in London as evidence of an increased feeling of security within Russia and a sign that drastic measures were no longer necessary to preserve the state.

The broadcast—recorded here last night by the Soviet monitor—said the president of the supreme Soviet court had decided that the death penalty was no longer necessary under wartime conditions in the Soviet Union and that 25-year sentences in labor camps would be substituted.

The president is an executive and legislative body which acts between sessions of Russia's parliament, the supreme council of the union.

Before the war Russia imposed death penalties for murder, highway robbery and sabotaging state property. Apparently the measure applies to political offenses as well as crimes of violence. Hitherto political offenders often have been punished by execution—single or in groups.

The courts had abolished the death sentence in Russia in 1933, and all manufacturers guilty of capital crimes were sentenced to perpetual exile at hard labor in Siberia. The death penalty was re-invented after the fall of the czarist regime.

Cross Wins Science Award

DORRIS, May 27—Robert Gross, Jr., this year was the winner of the annual Baugh and Lomb honor science award for Butte Valley high school, according to an announcement made this week by local school officials and the optical company. The award is made each year to outstanding senior science students in high schools throughout the nation. Each winner is presented with a certificate and bronze medalion. In addition they are eligible for competing for the five annual Baugh and Lomb scholarships at the University of Rochester.

Gross has been active in all high school activities here. He is president of the student council and was co-editor with Bob Shelby of the "White and Gold" high school year book. He also won letters this year in basketball and track. He is a licensed pilot and expects to enter San Jose State college next fall for a four-year course in aeronautical engineering. Gross is salutatorian of this year's graduating class.

Seismograph Shows Severe Shocks

DENVER, May 27 (AP)—A series of severe earth shocks were recorded late last night and early today by the seismograph at Regis college. The Rev. Joseph V. Downey, seismologist at the school, reported the first shock at 11:17 (MST) and the last one after 2 a.m. He estimated the quakes were strong enough to have caused heavy damage if they occurred in populated areas but he figured the epicenter was about 7000 miles west and south of Denver, somewhere in the South Pacific.

Camp Fire News

With the preliminary announcements made at the Dad-Daughter banquet Friday night, the plans for Camp Fire summer camping program are now well under way. Following the customary alternating of the opening and closing of camp, the Camp Fire Girls will attend Camp Father Applegate during the first two weeks of August, from August 3 to August 17.

Any girl who is a registered member of a Blue Bird, Camp Fire, or Horizon club group is eligible to attend camp, and registrations are now open at the Camp Fire office in Miller's store. Office hours are from 10 to 12 in the mornings, and from 2 until 5 in the afternoons. It is suggested that registrations be made early, since the capacity of camp facilities have not increased to meet the need of increased registration in Camp Fire work.

The director and adult counselors will be women who have had several years experience in camp. The

adult counselors, who will act as instructors, will be in direct charge of groups of girls. Swimming will be under the supervision of a woman who has qualified for the Red Cross Waterfront Instructor's certificate. A registered nurse will be in camp.

The camp is located on a beautiful wooded hillside overlooking Lake of the Woods. It is ideally located to offer the regular camping activities, such as hiking, nature study, outdoor cooking, handicraft and swimming.

Each group leader will receive detailed bulletins to be given to the girls in her group. In some bulletins already distributed, it was erroneously stated that Blue Birds would attend camp during the second week. This should read during the first week of camp, or from August 3 to August 10.

Anyone desiring more information about the summer camping program is invited to call at the office during regular office hours, or to phone 4884.

An all-day training course in outdoor craft was held at Spencer creek on Wednesday, for leaders needing help in that particular division of the Camp Fire program. The course was conducted and sponsored by the Leader's association under the direction of Mrs. L. A. French. Mrs. Aus-

tin McMahon and Mrs. Betty Reed demonstrated pit-cooking, preparing a well balanced meal in one pit. Mrs. John McAndrews directed the use of the reflector oven, cooking biscuits for the group, and Mrs. French and Mrs. Louis Meyer demonstrated the use of cranes over the open fire also preparing a part of the feast.

Plant identification and bird study were also a part of the course. Blue prints, spatter prints and smoke prints were made of grasses and leaves.

This trip was a part of the Camp Fire Leaders' association's program to train every Camp Fire leader in the work of the program. Members of the organization, or members of the community at large, who are specially trained in certain fields such as outdoor lore, nature work, music, folk-dancing, etc., offer their services to acquaint both new and old leaders with their field. In this way a leader who takes advantage of this program need never feel at a loss to follow suggestions in the Camp Fire program book.

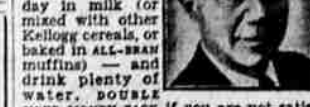
Chinese Diplomat To Canada Post

Hamburger Goop—Cook 1 cup each chopped onions, celery and green pepper in small amount of hot shortening until limp but not brown. Add 1 1/2 pounds ground beef and brown. Stir in one can undiluted condensed tomato soup, and season to taste with barbecue sauce, salt and pepper. Cover. Simmer 30 minutes. Serve on halved buns. Serves 6.

Toasted Doughnuts—String raised, glazed or plain doughnuts on long stick and toast over fire until they're warm and sticky.

Salmon Wiggle—Combine a No. 2 can of salmon and a No. 2 can of peas, drained, with one can undiluted condensed cream of mushroom soup. Cook until heated through. Serve on or with rusks or Melba toast.

Cling Peach and Cream Cheese Salad—Before the hike blend together a 3-oz. package of cream cheese and 1/4 cup mayonnaise; stir in 1/4 cup each chopped celery and chopped nuts and a sprinkling of salt. When ready to serve, top canned cling peach halves with cheese mixture. Serve on lettuce.
