Doctors Face Damage Suit

A suit for \$10,000 damages has been filed in circuit court here, naming four physicians, Dr. F. Cecil Adams, Dr. Merle Swansen, Dr. Ray W. Oldenburg and Dr. R. H. Englecke, and involving the Klamath Medical Service Bureau, by Raymond Maye, plaintiff.

Maye states that he was a member of the Medical Service Bureau and entitled to its benefits, and that on February 28, 1947, he was stricken with a pain in his side. He contends that he was examined by his own physician, Dr. Samuel D. Earhart, who diagnosed his ailment as either kidney stone or abscess of the kidney.

He pointed out, however, that the bureau contract provides that although a member may select any physician to treat him, he must undergo examination by one of the bureau's staff, and the physician is bound to follow the diagnoses and treatment prescribed by the bureau staff.

The complaint states that the bureau's staff, the above named four physicians, diagnosed Maye's ailment as infected appendix and forced Dr. Earhart to operate for that.

The complaint adds that after the operation was completed there was found to be nothing wrong with Maye's appendix, and charges that another operation will have to be performed now, as he is still in pain.

The damages are asked for the mental and physical discomfort occasioned Maye, and the loss of time and money involved in the false diagnoses.

Lord, Anderson and Franklin of Portland are acting as Maye's attorneys. Maye, a veteran, is a former Ewauna Box company employe.
