

# Market Shows Good Upswing

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—The stock market today enjoyed its best upswing in a week as short covering operations, in preparation for a lengthy week-end, lifted leading stocks, motors, rails and specialties 1 to around 4 points on the largest volume since last Thursday.

Good dividends spurred such issues as Wheeling Steel, Best Foods and Mathieson Alkali.

Ahead were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, General Motors, Chrysler, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern Railway, Northern Pacific, Douglas Aircraft, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, International Harvester, American Telephone, Anaconda, American Can, General Electric, Du Pont, Johns-Manville, J. C. Penney, Standard Oil (N.J.), American Woolen and International Paper.

Buying by professionals was attributed partly to the idea the list could negotiate a further technical upswing and that prospects of a summer rally still were bright.

# Grain Price Soars Today

CHICAGO, May 28 (AP)—Rain, snow, sleet and cold provided the background for soaring grain prices on the board of trade today. Urgent commission house buying uncovered stop-loss orders and the market moved upward in an active trade.

Corn paced the upturn. The yellow cereal recorded gains of as much as 8 cents, the daily limit, at one time. All deliveries cease, all corn except the December contract and the December and May, 1948, wheat deliveries reached new seasonal highs.

# Foster Makes Third Break

Darvin Patrick Foster, 18, the army deserter who held up the Western Union office here last August 31 and was quickly captured, has made his third break from arrest since turned back to army authorities, according to a bulletin received by the sheriff's office.

Foster is said to have escaped from a U. S. marshal in Topeka, Kans., on April 17.

While en route with a military policeman from Klamath Falls to Salina, Kans., a few days after the robbery here, Foster jumped from a train at Green River, Wyo., and escaped.

Arrested later and taken to Salina, he broke out of the military stockade, stole a pistol and army command car and escaped through a road block. Apparently he has been recaptured, turned over to federal authorities and is now at large again.

When arrested here, Foster said that he was going to Portland to kill Carl A. Dahl, Portland attorney, who had handled a small estate for Foster's father.
