Dry Weather Makes Hazard

MISSOULA, Mont., May 29 (AP)—Prolonged dry weather has made forests of eastern Washington, Northern Idaho and Montana highly combustible, pointing toward a serious fire threat in the near future unless relief comes from rain, C. B. Crocker, fire control chief for forest service region No. 1, said today.

Crocker warned that campers, picnickers and fishermen throughout the region should be careful and not be deceived by the general greenness of the woods.

As an example of the dryness, Crocker said precipitation on the Nezperce forest in Idaho since January 1 was 59 per cent of normal.

TOKYO, May 29 (AP)—U. S. capture of Guadalcanal in 1942 forced the Japanese general staff to abandon plans for an offensive against Chungking, China's wartime capital, and for new operations in the Aleutians, the international war crimes tribunal was told today.

Former Lt. Gen. Shinichi Tanaka, chief of the operating section of the Japanese general staff from 1940 through 1942, testified plans Japan was forced to drop were designed to place the U. S. and Great Britain in a passive defense role.
