Basin Honors War Dead

Between intermittent torrents of rain yesterday morning, the members of the various veterans organizations and citizens gathered to pay tribute to the dead of three wars in befitting Memorial Day ceremonies.

Early in the morning, friends and former navy men gathered at the Link river bridge for a naval burial ceremony with the Rev. Victor Phillips acting as chaplain. In true naval style a sea-burial was held in memory of the men who lost their lives in the service with the navy and coast guard.

A short parade was held to the memorial shaft on the courthouse lawn, at the base of which wreaths were laid. Chamber of commerce president Phil Hitchcock, acting as master of ceremonies at the event and introduced Jack Linman, chairman of the war memorial committee, who, in his role as principal speaker for the day, reminded his audience of the great sacrifices which had been made in the service of the country, and warned that America must remain strong in the event of future war.

A facsimile of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was erected before the Veterans Memorial building and appropriate wreath ceremonies were conducted there also.

Following the rites at the courthouse, the group paraded to Link river cemetery where the Veterans of Foreign Wars conducted services over the grave of a war veteran.

During the observances, groups of planes, wings and squadrons dipping their wings in tribute to the occasion.

New Training Plane Here

Rankin will operate two cabs with Everett Williams as the other driver and will cover the territory around Malin and Bonanza and into Klamath Falls, operating from an office in the Malin hotel.

He has driven for OGAN stages, Klamath Bus company, Greyhound, and California Transit companies, and has lived in Klamath Falls for the past six years.

Williams comes from Bend where he has been working as a cab driver for the past few years.

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Reynolds In Boise Chamber

Earl C. Reynolds, for many years secretary of the Klamath County chamber of commerce and now assistant manager of the western division of the United States chamber of commerce, has been accepted as a member to become manager of the Boise chamber, it was disclosed today.

Reynolds will take over his new duties at Boise on July 1. At the Idaho capital he will succeed Ned Harlan, former Oregon chamber man, who is moving to the Dalles to go into private business.

For the last three years, Reynolds has held the job with the U. S. chamber, with headquarters at San Francisco. He has retained his home here in the Henley district.

Reynolds said today that Tom Canning, former Klamath Falls man who has been chamber manager at Lewiston, Idaho, for several years, has been given the job of Idaho state director of publicity, and also is moving to Boise.

Paine Admits Car Theft

Alfred Paine, the escaped San Quentin prisoner who fought with police here seven weeks ago, has finally admitted stealing a car in Klamath Falls and driving it to Port Klamath, there abandoning it and taking another car. Paine had previously denied taking either car.

The information was received in a bulletin by the state police. Following the gun battle with police last March 31, Paine disappeared with a 1937 Chevrolet belonging to Ward Hieron on Oregon avenue. This car was later found at Port Klamath and a Pontiac belonging to Harold Wimer was found stolen from there.

The trail ended with the last stolen car until police at Russellville, Ark., arrested Paine on May 6. At first Paine refused to tell what he had done with the car, but finally admitted selling it to a man at Russellville for \$50. Police found the man, who had in the meantime sold the car again, also for \$50.

Authorities still have not been able to find out what Paine was doing or where he was during the intervening month from his escape and capture.

Crash Rumor Followed Up

The air rescue service has dispatched a plane to Trail, Ore., about 30 miles north of Medford, to investigate a report that wreckage of a plane had been sighted there. Capt. Douglas A. Lawhead, USA, said.

Capt. Lawhead said a navy pilot on a routine flight reported that he had seen what appeared to be the tail section of a plane, lying on the south side of a slope near the town of Medford. The air rescue plane will fly over the area to take photographs, then will land at Medford to make a land search.

McChord field officials said no aircraft are missing or overdue recently, although an O-52 has been missing since January and a civilian Navion has been missing in the area since March.
