## SB 376 To Be Talked Here

The attitude of the community toward senate bill 376, and whether it should be put on the October ballot, will be discussed at a meeting at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday in the county court room, by members of the county museum commission and the Klamath Historical society.

The bill, passed by the state legislature, is to enable the state to levy a one mill tax for the support of work of historical societies in preserving and recording historical material.

Consideration of the possible use of the county museum rooms in the Veterans Memorial building for exhibiting historical material on hand now, will be made at the joint meeting.

Appointment of a person to be on duty in the rooms, if they are used for this purpose, will also be considered. This person will be director of the museum and historical library thus established, and assist the public in research work.
