Suddenly, Jack, our magician butcher, buried the cards at the ceiling. They all fluttered down but the queen of clubs which stuck there, pinned by a thumb tack, and initiated by the GCS-T-B.

Well, the GCS-T-B hightailed it out of the place with the speed of his best arrow, mumbling something about spirits. That was back in 1911 and he hadn't been seen until today.

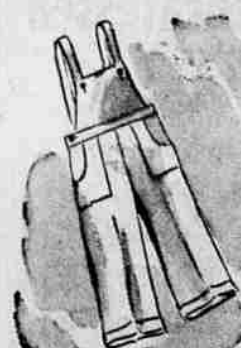
