

Tule Summer Recreation Program Under Way With Full Schedule Mapped Out

TULELAKE, June 4 (AP)—William J. Proctor, University of California, has been selected as director of the Tulelake summer recreation program which got under way Monday. Proctor, who comes highly recommended, will arrive prior to June 15 and will continue in his supervisory capacity until August 31.

He has been employed by the recreation department of Richmond, Calif., as playground instructor, has been president of the Federation of

Youth clubs in that city and has had nine years Scouting experience. During the recent war when he served in the medical department of the army air corps he aided in planning recreation for USO centers and the Red Cross.

The recreational program as outlined by the committee is wide in scope and will provide healthful, stimulating periods of relaxation for old and young. The committee and program, sponsored by the chamber of commerce, will operate independently of the chamber with 17 organizations represented on the committee and pledged to assist with various phases of the work.

Beginning Monday and every day following from 2 until 4 o'clock the program opens on the playground of the elementary school with activities sponsored by the PTA. Volunteer supervisors will be on hand to take charge of story telling, games, handicraft, music and folk dancing. All children who live in the community are invited to participate.

The first teen-age dance, with the Tulelake chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, in charge, is scheduled for Wednesday, June 11, in the high school gymnasium starting at 8:30. These dances will be held each Wednesday during the summer.

Other activities to start in the near future will include tennis classes, swimming classes in Klamath Falls, a horseback tournament, horseback riding club, a boy's gun club, Sea Scout program and both softball and league baseball.

In addition to the teen-age dances sponsored by the Eastern Star, the Mariners' club will handle the swimmers, the Tulelake post, American Legion, the inter-city soft-ball games for youths up to 17 years; the volunteer fire department, inter-league baseball; the Rotary club, Sea Scouts; Tulelake post, VFW, gun club, and the PTA, the daily playground program.

A total of \$650 has already been donated for finances, \$200 from the Tulelake Growers, fire department, chamber of commerce, Order of the Eastern Star, and \$50 from the Mariners' club.

Don Potter, chairman of the chamber of commerce, has appointed Thorburn Ribben and W. H. Shepard to act as treasurer and advisor to the recreation committee.

Ross Reglund, manager of the Tulelake Cold Storage company, is general chairman.

More than \$600 has been donated to get the program off to a good start and 17 city and rural social and civic organizations have pledged further financial support and assistance with activities.

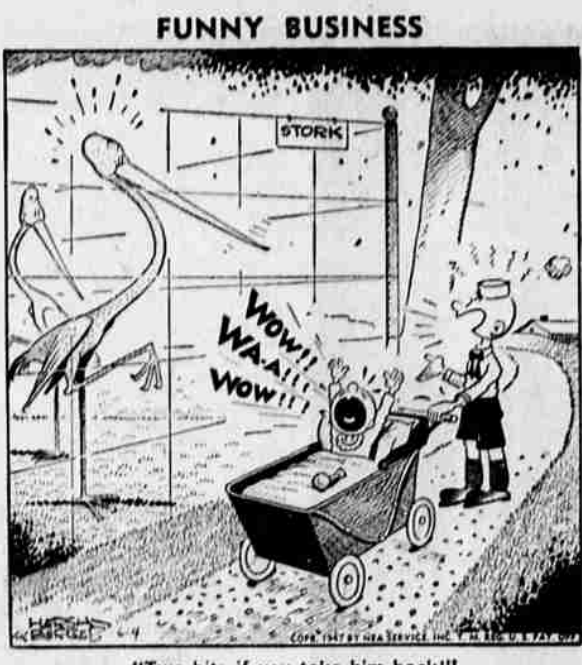

Consolidation Of Timber Grants OK

PORTLAND, June 4 (AP)—Consolidation of Oregon and California land grant timber tracts through exchanges with national forest service areas was backed today by the Association of Oregon and California Land Grant Counties.

The move would require amendments to existing federal legislation but the group said it would improve reforestation, economize on administration costs and eliminate claims of the counties to about 269,000 acres of controverted indemnity lands.

About 2,300,000 acres of O and C land would be involved in the exchange.

Milk Plant Plan Out

NYSSA, June 4 (AP)—The Avostet company, which had been planning since 1945 to establish a milk processing plant here, has abandoned the project, according to M. K. Jordan, president of the Avostet company at San Francisco.

John Sirex, assistant to Jordan, said "we feel there is not sufficient milk in the area to justify the construction of a plant as large as the one we had in mind."

Nyssa business leaders expressed the belief that high prices and the scarcity of building materials were factors affecting the company's decision.

The company had purchased a 40-acre tract of land here and had constructed one building, in which several pieces of equipment were stored.

Cane Berry Price Takes Big Drop

SALEM, June 4 (AP)—Willamette valley cane berry growers today were reported alarmed by price quotations of 6 cents compared to the 20 cents a pound paid last year.

William J. Linfoot, secretary of the Oregon cane fruit control board, reported growers fear the picking prices of 4 to 5 cents will wipe out any profit.

The 6-cent offers were reported to have originated with brokers and distributors, passed along by canners and packers, because of heavy carryover stocks from last year.

Hadassah Asks More Members

SPOKANE, June 4 (AP)—A plea for new members to enable Hadassah, organization of Jewish women, to enlarge its philanthropic and child rescue programs in Palestine, was voiced yesterday by Mrs. David Halpern of Eugene, Ore., regional president.

Mrs. Halpern told delegates from the four Northwest states the organization has established pre-natal clinics in Palestine for Jewish, Arab and Christian mothers; provides lunches for 30,000 school children daily, and has evacuated 23,000 orphaned children from Europe to Palestine since 1933.
