The trophies were presented by Superintendent Arnold Gralapp. The awards were based on findings of members of the faculty and names of the two were kept a secret until last night.

Truman Raps Soviet Coup In Hungary

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—President Truman today denounced the communist coup in Hungary as an outrage and asserted that the United States does not intend to stand idly by in that situation.

He told a news conference that the state department right now is looking into the whole Hungarian affair.

A reporter said that it has been suggested that the United States is sometime in the position of shaking its fist at Hungary and sometimes just shaking its finger. He inquired whether the United States intended to do something in the present situation and Mr. Truman replied that it does not intend to stand idly by.

In response to another inquiry he said that the Hungarian situation is terrible and reiterated that the state department is making a full investigation.

Balkan Federation
Diplomatic authorities are speculating whether the Hungarian coup may be followed by steps to set up a Balkan federation of Soviet-dominated states in Eastern and Southern Europe.

Until last week, Hungary's non-communist government was the sole break in an otherwise solid lineup of Moscow-controlled nations extending from the Baltic to the Adriatic seas.

Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia has been an outspoken advocate of a formal Balkan federation, and such a development now is being viewed here as a definite possibility.

Like the Hungarian overturn, it would be regarded as (1) a curt Moscow rejoinder to the American program of aid to Greece and Turkey and (2) a move to solidify the Soviet bloc before final ratification of the satellite peace treaties forces withdrawal of Red army occupation forces.

Diplomats also consider as a possible next Russian step in Eastern Europe some action to perpetuate the communist domination of Czechoslovakia.

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Sailing Captain To Be Buried

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5 (AP)—Capt. Humphrey C. Neilson, 64, who as captain of the sailing ship British Yeoman figured in one of the 1917 naval exploits of the German sea raider, Count Von Luckner, will be buried here tomorrow.

Capt. Neilson, his wife and the crew of the Yeoman were taken off the ship while Von Luckner's gunners blasted it to the bottom of the Atlantic. Later they were placed aboard a captured allied ship with 265 prisoners taken by the Germans and given enough food and water to reach Rio De Janeiro.

The Neilsons lived briefly at Seattle and had been here since 1934. The widow survives.

Portland May Get Carrier

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5 (AP)—The aircraft carrier Enterprise has been offered to the city of Portland as a relic of World War II.

Acceptance of the "Big E"—often called the fighting ship in the navy—hinges on several factors including approximately \$100,000 a year maintenance costs.

Offer of the carrier which fought in every major Pacific engagement except the battle of the Coral sea was made by Capt. A. C. Burrows, public information officer of the 13th naval district, at the direction of Rear Adm. George H. Fort.

Mayor Earl Riley said the city would be interested only if the carrier were left here permanently. She would require considerable space for berthing, having a length of 827 feet and draft of 26 feet.

National Auto Law
Hearings Slated

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—Hearings on legislation to enact nationwide laws on automobile driving soon will be called by a subcommittee of the house interstate and foreign commerce committee.

Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.), chairman of the subcommittee, said today he expected to start hearings in the near future.

The proposal would set up a division in the interstate commerce commission to issue permits for all interstate driving and for licensing all drivers.

20-30 Hears Birmingham

The 20-30 club heard C. William Burningham, planning secretary for the U. S. bureau of reclamation, who spoke on forming service clubs at the meeting Tuesday night.

The Western Knights association's fifth annual meeting will be held at the armory June 6, it was announced, and the state convention for 20-30 is set for June 14-15 in Salem. About 20 members of the local club are planning to attend.

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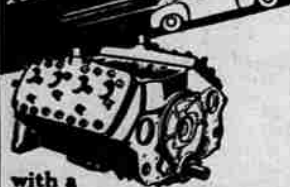
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
