

Northwest Fruit Growers Face Huge Losses Due To Carryover From Last Year

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Faced with heavy losses through inability to sell this year's soft fruit crop, Pacific Northwest growers have appealed to Rep. Horan (R-Wash.) for government aid in moving last year's crop, still in possession of canners and freezers.

Horan told a reporter he has asked that the state, war and agriculture departments use the fruit canned and frozen last year for European relief and the departments now are trying to work out such a plan.

The canners and freezers put up large amounts of poor fruit at high prices last year, Horan said.

Consumer resistance to the prices has caused fruit to remain in the plants, he continued, and the pack-

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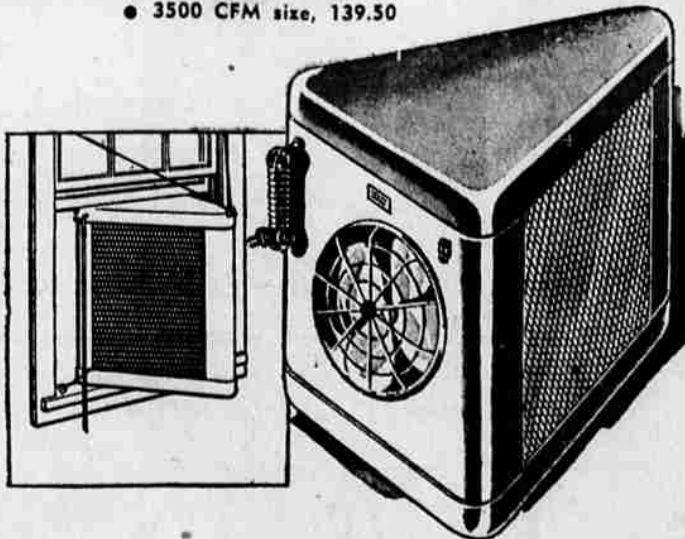
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Summer Camp Plans For Camp Fire Girls Talked

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Rains Of Past Week Prove Lifesaver To Basin Farms

Rains of the last eight days have been particularly beneficial to agriculture and livestock in the Klamath basin. Throughout the week showers have occurred in different places, therefore there is considerable variation in the amount of moisture that has fallen in individual districts.

From Klamath Falls north, including the Upper Klamath marsh, moisture has been fairly heavy in most places. South of Klamath Falls in the main project, showers have been particularly spotted and a few areas report particularly light moisture. This seems to be particularly true in most of the Henley section.

Good rains have occurred in the Tulelake and south end districts. The southeastern part of the county has been particularly spotted, with a great variation in moisture received. Present weather forecast is for unsettled weather for this week with considerable shower activity particularly in the mountain sections. Showers, however, are expected to occur throughout all sections of the Klamath basin with light winds occasionally, and possible thunderstorms.

The rain has been particularly timely throughout the entire county and particularly helpful on dry land grain, potatoes planted in dry dirt and on young grain under irrigated conditions. Mountain ranges have benefited particularly and prospects for summer pasture have increased tremendously. Along with the rain showers and mild weather, cool, cloudy days have been particularly helpful to all grain crops. The term "million dollar rain" perhaps only mildly describes total value to agriculture in the entire Klamath region.
