

# Portland Smothers Oakland

Rain seems to have a lot of influence on the Pacific Coast league lead these days.

It caused postponement of six Portland games and that rather obviously put the Beavers in a position to form last night as they bombarded the leaders, Oakland, 15-3 on 20 hits, including two homers, a double and 17 singles.

Meantime, Sacramento and San Francisco were rained out at the bay city. The combination put Oakland and San Francisco into a tie for the lead, with Los Angeles a half game back.

Four Oakland pitchers couldn't stem the Portland hit tide last night. One of them, Damon Hayes, was knocked out of the box when he hit below the knee by a line drive by George Vico in the fifth inning. His successor, Charley Gassaway, pitched a home run ball to Herma Reich, Radulovich, getting the other Beaver four-sacker. Vince Diblas was the winning pitcher, allowing Oakland six hits.

Los Angeles also was hit-happy, getting 22 blows off three San Diego pitchers to swamp the Padres, 14-0. The Angel hurler, Red Lynn, gave San Diego only four hits. He struck out nine men.

The Hollywood Stars won a 12-inning battle from Seattle 2-2, although the Rainiers outthrew them, 10-5. In the third for Seattle Johnny Rucker singled, stole second and scored on Manager Jo-Jo White's single. Hollywood scored twice in the sixth on Tony Lupini's homer with Jim Keisinger aboard by way of an error. Three hits for Seattle tied the score in the seventh.

The stars won it in the 12th as Fred Vaughan and Don Ross walked. Al Unser bunted and Seattle Third Baseman Hillis Layne dropped a throw, permitting Vaughan to score.

## Keiser Charges USGA With Bias Toward Open Choices

AKRON, O., June 5 (AP)—Herman Keiser, pro at Akron's Firestone country club and one of the country's top-flight golfers, Wednesday charged that the United States Golf association had discriminated against him.

Keiser said that he was scheduled to participate in the U. S. Open qualifier at Pitchburg, Mass., earlier this week but an injury to his hand received in the recent Goodall tournament has forced him to remain idle for a few days.

After returning to Akron, Keiser said he learned that the qualifier for Northern Ohio entrants had been postponed from Monday to Wednesday because of rain.

He said he requested permission from Joseph Dey, USGA secretary, to play in the Canton tourney, but that his query was not answered.

"It's discrimination any way you look at it," the Akron pro said. "The USGA made exceptions for other golfers, but refused to consider my request."

Keiser, whose hometown is Springfield, Mo., also criticized the USGA for disqualifying George Schou at New York for carrying 16 clubs, when 14 is the maximum.

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# Injuries Slow Loop Leaders

Both Ends Of National League Deadlocked; Three Detroit Regulars Hurt In Yank Game

Injuries the first week in June may have been the turning point of the campaign for the major baseball league 1947 race winners.

In the past few days the Detroit Tigers and Boston Red Sox in the American league and the Brooklyn Dodgers and Chicago Cubs in the National have been crippled by injuries which might prove damaging to their pennant aspirations.

Pete Reiser, Dodger star centerfielder, suffered a "laceration of the skull" in a collision with the concrete centerfield wall at Ebbets field.

Dr. Dominic Rossi, the Dodgers' physician, said Reiser had a V-shaped cut on the top of his head but could not immediately determine the seriousness of the injury.

Three Detroit regulars were injured in yesterday's doubleheader with the New York Yankees. They were George Kell, hard-hitting third baseman; Dick Wakefield, slugging left fielder and Paul (Dizzy) Trout, one of the Tigers' first string pitchers.

Kell suffered cuts on the left knee and right hand from the spikes of New York's George Stinnett, on a close play at third. Wakefield twisted his left knee sliding into second. Trout, leading 9-2 in the last of the seventh of the same game, gave way to Freddie Hutchinson after a recurrence of an old groin injury.

On the playing end, the Cubs, behind the Tigers, had pitched off Fordham Hank Borowy, handed the Giants their first shutout defeat of the season 6-0 and went into a first place tie with the New Yorkers.

The Dodgers, led by Pee Wee Reese, who hit a grand slam home run off Elmer Singleton, moved within four points of the deadlocked Cubs and Giants by whipping the Pirates for the third straight time 9-4.

Detroit retained its two game lead in the American league by dividing a doubleheader with the Yankees. After the Tigers had pitched off opener 6-2 behind Trout, the Yankees unloosed their siege guns to take the nightcap 17-8.

Bobby Feller, who recently disclosed he suffered from a stiff shoulder, won his first game since May 18 when he pitched the Indians to a 6-2 victory over Washington in a night game in Cleveland.

The Boston Braves prevented the St. Louis Cardinals from leaving the National League cellar by defeating the Redbirds 3-1 in a night game in Boston. The win put the Braves one game behind the Cardinals. Earl Torgeson, of Snohomish, went hitless for the first time in 16 games.

Home runs by Ted Williams and Sam Mele, the latter with one on, gave the Boston Red Sox and Joe Dobson, a 5-2 victory over the Browns in St. Louis.

Ken Heintzelman pitched the Phillies to a 9-2 win over the Cincinnati Reds in Philadelphia.

The Philadelphia Athletics pounded across seven runs in the top of the 11th to whip the White Sox in Chicago 10-3.

**Beck Signed For Oilers**  
OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 5.—One of the highest honors that can come to a college basketball player was received by Lew Beck, brilliant guard on the 1947 Pacific Coast conference champion Oregon State quintet, last week when the Pendleton speedster was signed to play with the famous Phillips Oilers at Bartlesville, Okla., next season.

Beck will work for the oil company as well as play on its ball club. Phillips Oilers have been the national AAU champions for five consecutive seasons and their team last winter was rated as one of the most powerful hoop aggregations ever assembled in this country. Some of its stars whom Beck will play with next season are Bob Kurland, Gordon Carpenter and Jimmy "Scat" McNatt.

The Orange guard and floor captain was one of four college players throughout the country signed by the Oilers for next season. The other three are Arnold Tucker, All-American center from Oklahoma whom Beck played against in the NCAA western playoffs at Kansas City; Charley Black, forward from Kansas university; and Cliff McNeely from Texas Wesleyan.

The Cougars tangle with California, southern division winner, Friday and Saturday in a best-of-three series. Winner of the coast crown will represent the region in the NCAA western division playoffs in Denver, June 20-21.

California won the southern title yesterday, defeating Southern California 5-2.

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# Wildfowl Regulations Will Be Told During July; Short Season Coming

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—The government plans to issue its fall wildfowl regulations in July, a month earlier than usual.

There was no official indication as to the length of the new season, but unofficial guesses placed it at about 30 days compared with 45 last year. Reductions in bag limits also are expected.

The fish and wildlife service said its six-man committee on regulations, meeting with the agency's five regional directors, will start drafting the new hunting rules at Chicago next Monday.

The group will consider the decline in waterfowl population from 125,000,000 in 1944 and 80,000,000 last year to 54,000,000 last January—the lowest since 1938—and the tremendous increase in hunters since 1938, estimated as high as 200 per cent.
