

Museum Group Talks SB 376 At Meet; Building Sought

Further discussion was given Wednesday morning in the county court room with representatives of the county museum commission, county court and Klamath Historical society board present.

This bill, which offers financial assistance to historical societies in the acquisition of articles and data, as introduced by Senator Newberry of Ashland to the state legislature. While the bill cannot be voted on until November, 1948, plans were discussed to acquaint the public with the advantages of passing such a bill.

Alfred D. Collier, member of the

county museum commission and presiding at the meeting, reminded the group that funds from sales of delinquent county-owned land, amounting to approximately \$20,000, is available for museum use. Consideration was given the suggestion of obtaining the present jail building from the county court when the new jail is built, and using the funds for remodeling it for use as a museum.

The Historical society has a fairly complete library of books, diaries and manuscripts of the early Klamath country which should be available for use of scholars, it was brought out. This library is in storage now as there is no adequate building to house it, and such a place is of uppermost consideration by the group so that material on hand can be made use of and added to.

Discussion of a director to be in charge of a reading room and of museum pieces, concluded the meeting attended by nine persons.

Youth To Die For Murder

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 5 (AP)—William R. P. Henderson, 17, must lie on the gallows August 27 for his part in the February 26 slaying of Constable Charles Boyes.

The youth, the second within a week to receive the death penalty for a slaying, was found guilty by an assize court jury last night after only 42 minutes deliberation. Justice A. M. Manson pronounced sentence.

Harry Medos, 22, was found guilty last Friday and sentenced to hang July 30.

Boyes, together with Constable J. O. Ledingham and 19-year-old Douglas Eldon Carter were killed in the shooting affray that followed an alleged frustrated bank holdup at False Creek. Detective Percy Hoare, wounded three times in the affray, was credited with killing Medos and wounding Henderson.
