

# Betting On Horse That "Never Comes In" Said To Be Payoff Method

TACOMA, June 5 (AP)—The Tacoma civil service commission was told last night that Tacoma card rooms and amusement places which allegedly pay bribes to some officials do so by means of a bet on "a horse that never comes in."

Patrolman Evans, one of the original vigilante policemen but still a member of the force, testified that he had been told by an amusement center operator while in the office of Attorney Robert Copeland that monthly payoffs were made by the "betting" procedure.

The operator, Davies testified, would bet a fixed sum each month equivalent to the "payoff" on a horse. "No one ever heard of the horse winning," Davies said, and so an employe of the operator would then be dispatched with the money to the person collecting the bribe. Davies' testimony was given at the continuing reinstatement appeal of four policemen who have been discharged from the force for alleged vigilante activity and other actions detrimental to departmental "esprit de corps."

Three of the officers appealing for reinstatement, Eugene Reardon, Anthony Zatkovitch and Theodore Strand, testified that the former

corporation counsel Howard Carothers declined to accept evidence they had gathered on vice conditions because the officers "were going to be discharged, anyway."

The trio said they offered the evidence to Carothers just before they were notified of their discharge by Police Chief William E. Farrar.

The corporation counsel told them, they testified, that there just wasn't any point in taking the evidence as they would soon be civilians.

The fourth appealing policeman, Harwick Smith, did not take the stand, but is expected to testify at next Wednesday night's resumption of the hearings which have continued for nearly six weeks.

## Gambling Charge Filed

SPOKANE, June 5 (AP)—Orion W. Gross, prominent bowler and fight promoter, was arrested yesterday on a complaint charging him with conducting a gambling game.

He was released on \$10,000 surety bond, and was to be arraigned today.

Prosecuting Attorney Leslie M. Carroll said the action followed statements from D. J. MacGillivray Jr., Spokane realtor, who pleaded guilty to an embezzlement charge. Carroll said MacGillivray told him he had lost \$10,000 of his clients' money through bad investments and gambling.

## Court Upholds Tule Teacher

Superior Judge James M. Allen of Siskiyou county decided in favor of Eric A. Rose, ousted principal of Wilema elementary school near Tulelake, in the latter's fight with the school's board of trustees.

The judge directed that Harry Mitchell, George N. Frey and W. H. Anderson, the trustees, be ordered to draw two salary warrants in Rose's favor for \$581.94, covering back pay from February 23 through April 30. Rose's attorney, J. P. Corrae, added that if the pay for May is not voluntarily paid, action would be taken for its recovery.

Rose charged in his petition that his services were discontinued on February 24, 1947, without a public hearing and without his being charged with immoral or unprofessional conduct, as required by law.

Judge Allen's findings pointed out that Rose was employed as a principal on August 1, 1946, at a salary of \$2,600 per year. On February 24, 1947, the board passed a resolution directing that he should be notified in writing that his services should be discontinued.

Judge Allen found that this notice was illegal and that the board refused to permit Rose to perform any services since February 24.

The trustees were defended in the action by District Attorney Fred W. Burton Jr. and Assistant District Attorney Whitten Swafford of Siskiyou county.

Pet Potato Salad

Ingredients:

| 4 medium-sized potatoes              | 2 tablespoons ham or bacon fat |
| 1/2 cup boiling water                | 1/2 cup vinegar                |
| 2 cups shredded, raw carrots         | 2 tablespoons water            |
| 1 cup drained peas, cooked or canned | 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar          |
| 3 tablespoons flaxseed oil           | 1/2 teaspoon salt              |

Cover and boil potatoes until tender in boiling water. Drain and cool; remove skins; cut into thin slices. Put into bowl with shredded carrots and peas. Cook onion slowly 5 minutes in fat. Add vinegar, water, sugar, salt and pepper. Pour over vegetables. Add milk. Mix gently until well blended. Arrange lunch meat around edge of platter. Put salad in center. Makes 4 servings.

\*Cut-up celery can replace all or part of shredded carrot.

\*\*Ham, bologna, salami, canned lunch meat or left-over cooked meat can be used.

## AFL President Raps Labor Bill

NEW YORK, June 5 (AP)—President William Green of the American Federation of Labor told an overflow crowd at Madison Square Garden last night that the Taft-Hartley labor bill, which the house approved yesterday, was a "wide-open invitation to industrial strife."

Mayor William O'Dwyer, another of the speakers who for three hours criticized the labor legislation and its supporters, said the bill was a "shot in the arm for the advocates of totalitarianism."

Senator Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.), expressed belief the president would veto the legislation but it was clear he had no specific information Truman would do so.
