

Interest In Farm Bureau Held High

Growing interest in the farm bureau organization was indicated at the well-attended dinner meeting of the county board of directors held Tuesday evening in the Pelican parly room.

Seven farm communities were represented at the meeting attended by presidents and directors of farm bureau centers and their wives.

Dick Heintel, reporting for the field crops committee, stated that there would not be as much of a drop in grain prices as expected in the spring, due to increasing world demand.

Dairy Chairman Wilbur Relling discussed the drop in Portland milk prices and possible effect on Klamath prices. The situation in regard to a cow testing association in the county was also outlined by Relling.

An account of the potato situation in the United States, and the possible effect on the Klamath potato situation, was given by Scott Warren. Earl Mack, poultry chairman, brought out a number of statistics which gave a clear picture of conditions, not only at present, but the effect on egg prices and on Thanksgiving turkeys this fall.

E. A. Geary reported on the Cattle and Horse Breeders association meeting which he attended in Lakeview.

The recent meeting of the Klamath County Associated Women was reported by Mrs. Lee Holliday. Mrs. T. D. Jackson of Henley is chairman of the group.

Ideas and problems presented at local meetings were outlined by center presidents. Several matters affecting Klamath farmers were taken up and referred to farm centers for decision. The next directors' meeting will be held July 1.

Ripple Rock Removal Urged

Midshipmen Hear Forrestal

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 6 (AP)—Secretary of the Navy Forrestal said today the United States, to avoid another war, must solve "political, economic and security problems such as the nation has never faced."

This country is the "principal core of stability in a world shaken by six years of bitter and destructive fighting," Forrestal said in an address to the graduating class of the Naval academy. He predicted that the years ahead will be "more deeply vexed and troubled" than those which

have confronted any generation since the start of the Civil war. The class of 404 midshipmen whipped their white caps up toward the ceiling of the Naval academy's Dahlgren hall and launched their military careers in a world which Secretary Forrestal told them was full of "unrest and potential troubles." Of the graduates, 438 became navy ensigns, 33 second lieutenants in the marine corps. Some 23 others got their bachelor of science diplomas but were discharged or are awaiting final determination of their physical status for commission.
