

Kansas City Primary Vote Fraud Investigation Gains Heat; FBI Gets Go-Ahead

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) declared today that the current federal investigation of alleged irregularities in last summer's Kansas City democratic primary is "locking the barn after the horse is stolen."

"Even the oats are gone," he observed in an obvious reference to the recent theft of disputed ballots from a safe in the city election board's office.

Ferguson is chairman of a senate judiciary subcommittee which is looking into the justice department's actions in the Kansas City situation. He commented as the subcommittee resumed hearings.

Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) told Ferguson he had made "a nice political speech that will get your name on the front page of the Kansas City Star."

"Your name will be there too," Ferguson rejoined.

Ferguson said it seemed to him that the justice department should have ordered a "thorough investigation" before the ballots were stolen.

Drunk Pilot Draws Fine

TILLAMOOK, Ore., June 6 (AP)—A Seattle student pilot was in jail here today, serving a 30-day sentence after conviction on a drunken flying charge—the first such case in Oregon.

The conviction was obtained on a recently enacted state law. Under it, Allen Albert Black was found guilty of breaking down the Tillamook airport gate late at night, putting a girl friend into his light plane and attempting to take off. He ran into a hangar, wrecked the plane and caused damage estimated at \$2,000.

Black suffered broken ribs and a broken arm. The girl was uninjured. Thirty additional days of the sentence were suspended on condition Black pay a \$200 fine.

Civil aeronautics administration officials, who suspended his license, said Black had stopped here while on a cross-country navigation flight as a student from a flight school at Seattle.

Lifesize Statue Of Borah Given

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—A lifesize bronze statue of the late Senator William E. Borah stood today in the capitol rotunda.

It is the gift of Idaho to the nation and, after formal acceptance tomorrow, will be placed somewhere near the rooms of the foreign relations committee where he was a dominating figure for many years.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), now chairman of the foreign relations committee, will be the principal speaker at the dedication ceremony. Other talks will be made by Senator Dworshak (R-Idaho) and Gov. C. A. Robins of Idaho.

Tot Fights For Life



Nurse Emma Generale watches over Lolita McCauley, 10 months old, of Mt. Empraim, N. J., confined to an iron lung in a Philadelphia hospital. The baby's respiratory muscles became paralyzed after an illness and doctors said she is one of the youngest iron lung patients in medical history.

FBI agents made an inquiry last fall and subsequently federal officials announced no grounds were found for federal prosecution. Yesterday FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover said that investigation was a "preliminary one" in which only six persons were questioned.

Since that justice department decision, a state grand jury has followed up evidence developed by the Kansas City Star and indicted 78 persons. The now-stolen ballots were part of the evidence the grand jury assayed.

The FBI announced Wednesday that it has now received authorization from Attorney General Tom Clark to make a "full investigation."

Senate investigators asked three federal judges and a U. S. attorney today to tell how they reached the conclusion that the government lacked grounds to act against the alleged democratic vote frauds in Kansas City.

The witnesses are District Attorney Sam Wear and Judges Albert L. Reeves, Albert A. Ridge and John Skankie Collet.

Jap Problem Before House

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—America's own "displaced persons" problem—the 110,000 Japanese-Americans evacuated from the west coast and other areas as a military measure two months after Pearl Harbor—is now before a house committee.

The problem is one of compensating those evacuated for resulting losses, not as in Europe of finding them a home.

The Japanese-Americans, themselves, have taken care of the latter, after being released from detention camps. Some moved back to the homes they left in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Alaska or Hawaii.

Many others went to the Middle West, particularly to Chicago, and some went to the east coast. Fifteen hundred of them are now working

on a 15,000-acre industrialized farm near Camden, N. J.

A bill introduced by Rep. Michener (R-Mich.), now before a house subcommittee, would set up a commission in the interior department with authority to rule on claims of loss suffered by the Japanese-Americans, many of them citizens, as a result of the hurried removal.

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Misbranding or misrepresentation of furs would be prohibited under legislation introduced by Senators McCarthy (R-Wis.) and Johnson (D-Colo.).

The legislation would apply also to articles made wholly or partly of fur.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL TO PAVE AND IMPROVE APPLE GATE AVENUE FROM ITS EAST INTERSECTION WITH MITCHELL AVENUE TO ITS WEST INTERSECTION WITH WASHBURN WAY; AND DECLARING AND DIRECTING CERTAIN STEPS BE TAKEN IN CONNECTION THEREWITH SAID PROJECT TO BE KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 94.

WHEREAS, the City Engineer, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 2nd day of June, 1947, filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of improving Apple Gate Avenue, from its east intersection with Mitchell Avenue, to its west intersection with Washburn Way; said improvement to be

known as IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 94; and the council finding the said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ASSEMBLED IN REGULAR SESSION, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1
That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portions of said street, being filed here in June 2nd, 1947, be and the same are hereby approved, and said project shall be known as Improvement Unit No. 94.

Section 2
That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates as follows:

Said improvement to consist of: Cement concrete pavement six inches in depth and thirty feet in width, including curbs.

The estimated cost of all classes of improvements embracing all work and materials for the complete improvement of said project for each type of pavement being as follows:

Cement concrete pavement \$12,256.76
Asphalt concrete pavement \$10,584.50
Said estimates include engineering, supervision, advertising, clerical assistance, attorney's fees and unforeseen contingencies.

Section 3
That the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by the said improvement, to-wit: Beginning at the northwest corner of lot 639 in block 128 Mills Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence east along the south line of the alley in said block 128 to the West line of Washburn Way; thence south along the west line of Washburn Way to the north line of the alley in block 129 of said Mills Addition; thence north along the north line of said alley to the east line of Mitchell; thence north along the east line of Mitchell to the point of beginning.

Section 4
That all the property included in the aforesaid boundaries above described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by said improvement and assessed for the expenses thereof.

Section 5
That Monday, July 7, 1947, at the hour of 7:30 P. M. at the Council Chamber of the City Hall in Klamath Falls, Oregon, be fixed as the time and place for hearing of objections and remonstrances against said proposed improvement.

Section 6
That the Police Judge be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of such hearing to be published as provided by the City Charter of said City and shall publish this resolution as provided by law.

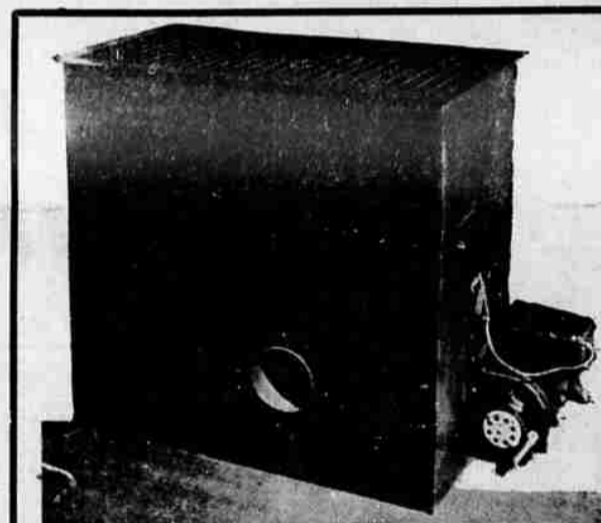
