ASUNCION, Paraguay, June 6 (AP)—Paraguayan rebels were reported fighting hard before their capital city of Concepcion today in the wake of a loyalist claim that one route of escape for the insurgents had been cut off through loss of the town of Capitán Bado.

No Contracts To Be Let

BOISE, Ida., June 6 (AP)—No major contracts for construction of Columbia basin irrigation works will be let during the coming fiscal year, Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Straus advised the regional office yesterday.

Harold T. Nelson, acting regional director, in announcing the decision said the bureau would fall short of sufficient funds for contracts now

in effect even though congress appropriated the full \$27,500,000 proposed.

The decision cancels the July and August bid calls for sections of the west canal, Potholes east canal, main canal, the Soap lake siphon and the Quincy pumping plant, Nelson said.



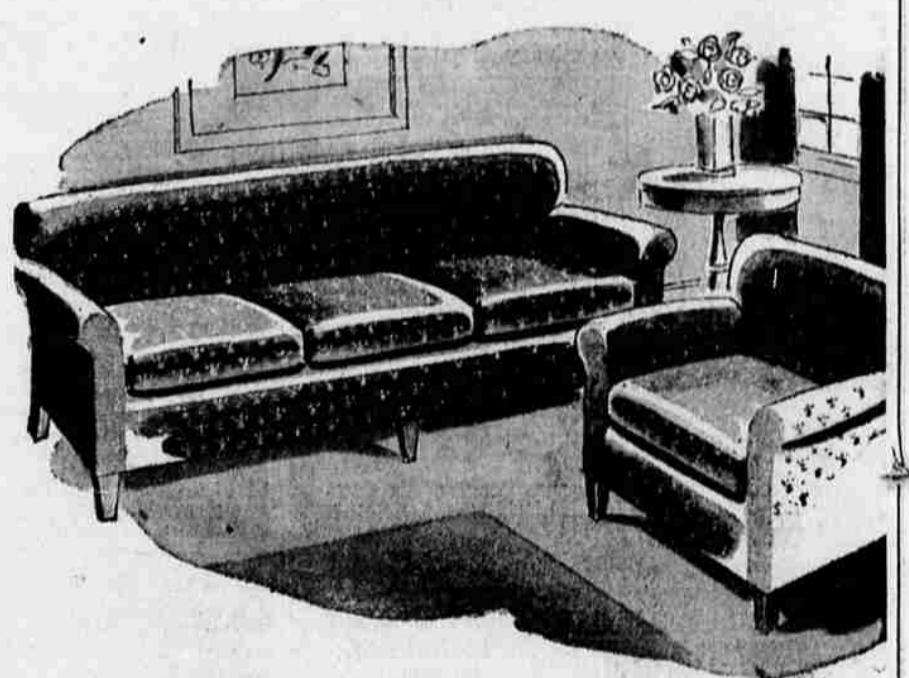
