

Meet To Be Called On New Route

As soon as plans for the proposed north entrance route are received from the state highway department, a public meeting will be held to give property owners along the site of the new highway a chance to voice their opinions on the subject, Mayor Ed Ostendorf said today.

Nothing can be done regarding the city's side of the project until the plans are received, the mayor added. The highway as proposed by the state will run from a point on the Dalles-California highway parallel to the railroad tracks and into Esplanade, making a direct line of travel through downtown Klamath Falls.

Long Discussed
The project has long been discussed by city officials and interested citizens, and brought rise to the problem of a means of directing traffic through the business district. A suggestion that streets leading into the new highway be closed brought rapid objections from residents of those streets.

The original proposal provides that all streets crossing the highway be closed with the exception of Portland and Esplanade, according to city officials, but nothing definite can be decided until plans are received.

Long Lines Of American Graves Memento Of D-Day

CHERBOURG, June 6 (AP)—Driving through the checkerboard pattern of hedgerows in Normandy on this third anniversary of D-Day, the breathtaking sight of endless rows of white crosses beneath the apple trees impresses one more than anything else.

When elements of five American divisions landed in Normandy—two by air and three by sea—on June 6, 1944, they opened one of the greatest, if costliest, military campaigns in American history.

Wresting the Cherbourg peninsula from the German forces that had vanquished Europe gave the allies a major seaport and enough space to load the continent with a striking force that was powerful enough to sweep 250 miles to Paris within one month after the break through at St. Lo.

But the men who secured the Cherbourg peninsula had to do it the hard way, and nearly 90,000 of them paid with their blood. There

are nine U. S. military cemeteries in Normandy where 28,462 white crosses mark the sleeping places of American soldiers dead.

Hedgerow fighting and the hard luck the paratroopers ran into on D-Day are generally accepted as the reason for this overwhelming figure.

The Nazi machine gunner, lying in wait behind the hedgerows, and the boche, who turned his ack-ack fire into the clouds of white silk that were American paratroopers, took a toll of approximately five to one.

There are only about 5000 Germans buried in Normandy—about 3000 at La Combe and another 2000 at St. Mere Eglise.
