Tule Sewer Bill Tabled

TULELAKE, June 6—Imminent need for improvement in the city water situation has pushed the proposed program for installation of storm sewers, curbs and gutters into the background of city council attention and city fathers have abandoned for the time being the plan to present the sewer question to voters at a special election this month.

Attention of the city instead will be focused on drilling a new well, bids to be opened either at the next regular council session June 16, or at a special session prior to that date. Present plans call also for installation of a softening plant on which delivery has been delayed for some months.

Plans as outlined by the council for increasing the water supply to a rapidly expanding population will probably call for a special election to determine sentiment of the voters on the project that will cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000. Bonding privileges that would have been absorbed by the sewer program will be transferred to the water project.

The city's water supply now comes from a 2000-foot well in the city park and in dry cycles that water department is unable to cope with demands for city water for sprinkling gardens and lawns, in addition to regular domestic use.

Barnett Delivers Address At Tule High Graduation

TULELAKE, June 6—"Any life plans of man which omit spiritual aid are without foundation," members of the graduating class of the high school were told Wednesday night at commencement by Rev. David P. Barnett Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Klamath Falls, in his address to the seniors.

The speaker urged that those going out into life discredit the prophets of doom who broadcast that because of the atomic age the world cannot make a spiritual comeback, and to work toward that end. In closing he stated, "Man is a spirit, and will be held accountable to God on that basis."

Thirty-one seniors received diplomas from W. G. Hagelstein, trustee of the Sixtyfour Joint Union high school board.

Awards, presented by Norman Esser, principal of the high school, went to Mary Robertson from the Bausch-Lomb Optical company for the most outstanding work in science. Helen Stoddard won the DAR citizenship pin; Herbert Kirby, honors for the most outstanding boy athlete and LuRee Dahle for the most outstanding girl athlete.

George Yost took the award for the highest scholastic honors and Mary Robertson for scholastic achievement among the girls. The best boy citizen was Chester Stonecypher and the best girl citizen Helen Stoddard. Mary Robertson was awarded a life membership in the California Scholarship federation, one of the highest honors awarded in the state. Mary made almost straight "A's" in each semester of four years in high school.

The senior class gift, \$100 in cash to finish payment on a new curtain for the stage was presented to the school by Peggy Taylor.

The invocation and benediction were by Rev. Glenn Ayers, pastor of the Full Gospel church, Tulelake.

Supreme Court To Hear Case

SALEM, June 6 (AP)—The state supreme court announced today it would hear arguments June 17 in the suit challenging the right of State Representative Earl Hill, Cushman, Lane county, to serve on the state fish commission.

The complaint, filed by Sheldon F. Sackett, Coos Bay newspaper publisher, charges that it is unconstitutional for any man to serve both in the legislative and executive branches of the state government.

The Marion county circuit court upheld Sackett, holding Hill could not have both jobs.

Similar suits were filed against State Senator Merle R. Chessman, Astoria, who was serving as a member of the highway commission, and State Senator W. H. Strayer, Baker, who was a member of the state board of geology and mineral industries. Chessman later resigned from the highway commission, and Strayer died.

The suits against Chessman and Strayer still are of record in the supreme court pending disposition of the suit against Hill.
