

Rodeo Committee Lays Plans To Select Queen

Big plans are under way by the Klamath Rodeo association for the selection of a queen to reign over the 1947 rodeo, July 4, 5 and 6. Eight communities have been invited to enter several candidates each. They are Merrill and Malin, Fort Klamath and Chiloquin, Tulelake, Dorris and Madocel, Bly and Bonanza, Klamath Falls, and Henley. One girl will be selected from each of these communities and the seven will compete for the honor of queen. The six remaining girls will serve as princesses in the queen's court.

Candidates will be judged on a percentage basis, 10 per cent on appointment, which means equipment and grooming of mount; 20 per cent on way of going, that is, manner in which the horse responds; 30 per cent on riding ability or horsemanship; 40 per cent on poise, including personality and appearance.

Candidates must be unmarried and between the ages of 18 and 25 years old, inclusive. All candidates from the seven areas will enter the tryout at the fairgrounds at 2:30 p. m., on Sunday, June 16. The public is invited to attend this free show when the seven eligibles will be cut out from the bevy of beauties. A special invitation is extended to past rodeo queens and princesses to attend.

Judges will be members of the Klamath Saddle club and appointment, way of going and riding ability of the seven picked girls will be judged at this time. Poise will be judged at the queen's ball which will be held at the armory on June 21, when girls will appear in formal. Candidates will be under the supervision of two chaperones, whose names will be announced later.

Community sponsors should list their applicants with Elmer Balaiger, president of KRA, at Balaiger Motor company. The association will present each of the princesses and the queen with riding shirts and hats.

The queen and her court will appear in numerous social functions as well as the parade which will be directed by E. P. "Pat" Ivory.

Milligan On Dorris Council

At the regular monthly meeting of the Dorris city council, Thursday evening, Mayor Howard Beeson announced that he had appointed Archie Milligan as councilman to fill the vacancy created by the death of D. R. Grace.

Milligan has been a resident of Dorris for 18 years, coming here in 1931 from Richmond, where he finished high school. He was employed by the Associated Lumber and Box factory here for 11 years, until he joined the armed forces in June, 1942. He was discharged in December, 1945.

After his return from the service, he resumed his position with the box factory, where he worked until this year, at which time he became associated with the Butte Valley State bank of Dorris.

The new councilman is active in

civic affairs and is second vice president of the Dorris Lions club, and also identified with local youth activities.

Policeman's Bullet Kills Burglar

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP)—A policeman's bullet critically wounded Charles Melvin Taylor, 36, as he fled from arrest on a burglary charge here last night.

Detective George Cawood said he fired the shot when Taylor broke away and tried to run into his rooming house. Cawood said he intended the bullet to go high. It struck Taylor in the head.

Cawood said Taylor and his wife had been arrested on a burglary warrant and were waiting in front of the rooming house for the patrol wagon at the time. He added that records showed Taylor had served terms for theft in the Kentucky and Wyoming state prisons.

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Krug Anguished At Budget Cuts

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6 (AP)—Congressional budget cuts are "wrecking" virtually every one of the nation's reclamation programs and seriously hampering administration of the national parks, says Interior Secretary J. A. Krug.

Krug expressed "amazement" at the general indifference he said was exhibited by the western states and their congressional representatives toward the reclamation projects.
