Wheat Weak Today

CHICAGO, June 7 (AP)—Rain and floods in Midwestern agricultural areas, creating apprehension over the crop outlook, were responsible for price advances in corn and oats on the board of trade today. Wheat weakened under hedging pressure.

All oats contracts reached new seasonal highs, as did July and September corn. The July corn contract sold at the highest price of any yellow cereal future here since May, 1920, when \$1.97 1/2 was reached in the inflationary boom after the First World war.

Best prices were not maintained, however, as a heavy profit-taking entered feed grain pits in the final half hour of trading. In wheat selling became more pronounced as the July contract, meeting increased hedging, dropped 5 cents under the preceding close.

Wheat finished 1 1/2-4 1/2 lower, July \$2.23 1/2-2.24 corn was 2 1/2 lower to \$1.88 1/2, and oats were 1/2-3/4 higher, July 97 1/2-98.
