Grass Seed Crop Good

LA GRANDE, June 7 (AP)—Union county grass seed crops, which last year grossed farmers over a million dollars, gave promise this week of a good average yield, H. L. Wagner, leading grass seed grower in the area, said today. Pea harvest outlook this week is 60 per cent better than it was last week, M. B. Blaimire, manager of the Elgin Pea Cannery, said. The peas were getting very dry and were dropping their blooms until the rains came, he said. Pea yield this year is estimated at between 1500 and 2500 pounds per acre, roughly the same as last year. Although the moisture came a little too late for summer wheat, prospect of a good wheat yield in the county is definitely improved, Fred Kiddle, manager of the Pioneer Flouring Mills at Island City, reported. The Grande Ronde valley wheat yield last year was 1,500,000 bushels, Kiddle said, but this year's crop will probably be substantially less because of the lateness of the rains.

Local Men End Trip

Senator Marshall Cornett and Oscar Kittredge, rancher, arrived in Klamath Falls Thursday night from Washington, D. C. They crossed the continent on the return trip in a DC-4. The two men left San Francisco for Washington on May 25 at 10:07 p. m. on the Stratoliner and arrived in New York the following morning at 7:10, just about nine hours later. The Stratoliner made one stop en route, at Lincoln, Neb., and cruised at an altitude of 30,000 feet. In Philadelphia the visitors from Oregon were entertained by the Mayor Charles Grewler, director of purchase for the city, who showed them through Independence Hall and took them over Boak Carter's home. Cornett and Kittredge have ordered a Beechcraft Bonanza, which they will pick up at Wichita, Kas., on June 28.

Air Firefighting Authority Lacked

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—James M. Landis, chairman of the civil aeronautics board, told senators today that federal aviation officials lack direct authority to require "adequate" fire fighting equipment at airports. Landis and Wallace S. Dawson, director of air safety for the CAB, also said it is doubtful that such equipment could save many lives in airline crashes because most accidents involving fires are too far from airfields.
