## PALACE NEWS

**TODAY'S LESSON** is about ham and bacon. Not just the ordinary kind but Johnson Packing Co.'s tenderized ham and bacon.

**THE FIRST** step is to kill, scald, scrape and chill under our Westinghouse ultra violet electronic rays.

Then they go to our stainless steel trimming tables where they are fabricated into primal cuts. Here the cuts that are to be cured go to the pumping room where we insert our secret formula of sugar cure brine into the vein with an electric brine pump to assure uniform distribution of the cure.

**NEXT**, they are placed in vats in the pickle cellar which is held by automatic thermostatic control at a temperature of 28 to 42 degrees. This regulated temperature is very important because if the temperature falls below 28 the cure does not work properly and if it rises above 42 degrees there is serious danger of sourness, rancidity and spoilage.

**AFTER** remaining in the pickle cellar for about 17 days they are then hung in our fireproof smokehouses and processed as follows: 1st 8 hours at 150 degrees without smoke. 2nd 8 hours at 140 degrees with imported hardwood sawdust smoke. 3rd 8 hours at 165 degrees or until an internal temperature of 145 is reached.

These smokehouses are the most modern with automatic thermostatic controlled temperature, and are absolutely necessary in order to produce a ham and bacon with the meticulous care that we require. We have a \$75,000.00 investment in our plant in order to furnish you the best because we know that we couldn't produce a fancy product without proper facilities. You might as well try to bake a fancy cake over a bonfire as to try to produce good ham and bacon without the most modern equipment and knowhow.

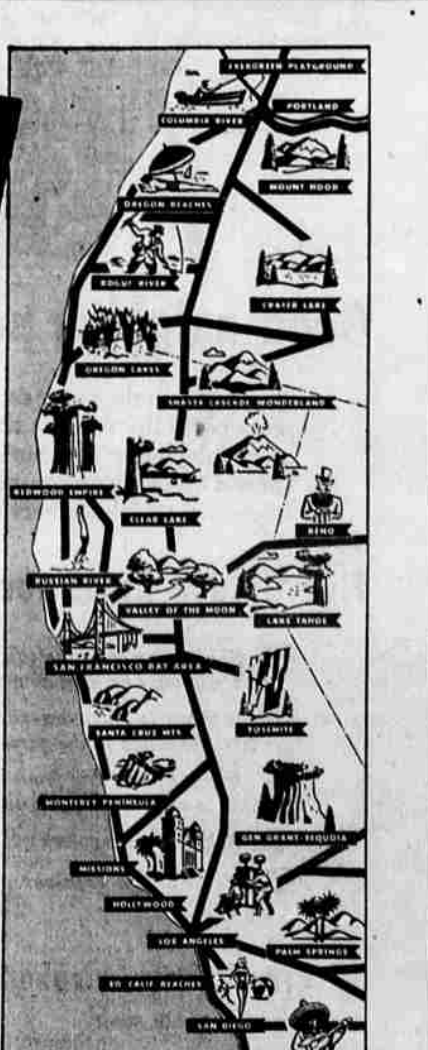
